Thrus the Law Aside. Cromwell Had His Own Views on the

Rights of an Embassy. Nowadays the invasion of a foreign mbassy would be a serious matter, but in the days when Oliver Cromwell was lord protector of England there was no fine discrimination to favor members of an embassy. When such members committed crimes against the law of the land they were held to the same accountability as' though they had been natives.

So it was that on July 10, 1653, Don Plantaleon Sa, a Portuguese noblenan, brother of the ambassador from that country to England and a knight of Malta, was beheaded on Tower hill. He had killed an Englishman, mistaking him for another. The Portuguese took refuge with his brother, the ambassador, who claimed that by the law of nations his house was an inviolable sanctuary for all his coun-

Cromwell sent a messenger to state that if the criminal was not given up to the civil authorities the soldiers would be withdrawn from guarding the embassy and the mob left to do as it pleased. Every effort was made by the Portuguese and other ambassadors to save Don Pantaleon's life, but without avail. Cromwell made no other reply than, "Blood has been shed, and justice must be satisfied." -Indianapolis News

Feats of Famous Speakers.

The man who holds the world's record for "quick-fire jaw" is Billy Sunday, the famous American evangelist. who can get through 45,000 words a day. It is true that a good deal of Billy's vocabulary would not be found in the Century Dictionary, but that only makes his performance the more

Among public speakers the average rate of delivery is about 8,000 words per hour. The Prime Minister is quite content to keep within this limit, but with such rapid speakers as Mr. Asquith, Mr. Bonar Law and Mr. Winston Churchill the rate frequently rises to 10,000 words an hour, and even through a long speech these speakers maintain an average of 150 words a minute, or 9,000 words an

Robert La Follette, the leader of the "windbag" senators at Congress, has long been famous "across the Herring Pond" as the most notorious "long-winded" speaker in the world. He thinks nothing of speaking five or six hours on end with an average of 160 words a minute. Even America's champion filibuster, however, does not come near the record created by Mr. Gladstone. Many of the G. O. M.'s speeches run something like 52,000 words, crowded into one stupendous effort of a little over four hours. The Attorney General, Sir F. E.

Smith, frequently averages 25,000 words a day when appearing in the Courts on behalf of the Crown, while men like Sir E. Marshall or Sir John Simon may be said to average something like 12,000 words per day all the year round.—Tit-Bits.
