CABLE NEWS.

AT IT AGAIN.
PARIS, Aug. 5.
The long range bombardment of the Paris region was resumed this morning.

SUBS. OPERATING.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.
The sinking of the American tank steamer O. B. Jennings, yesterday, 100 miles off the Virginia coast, announced to-day, revealed the presence of at least two German submarines on this side of the Atlantic. The second sub has been operating off the coast of Nova Scotia and nearby waters for several days.

INDEPENDENT SIBERIAN GOVT.
LONDON, Aug. 5.
The semi-official Russian newspapers Pravda and Isvestia declare that the Provisional Government of Siberia intends formally to declare war on the Soviet Government within a few days, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Copenhagen. The Siberian Government, it is said, has informed all neutral and Allied Powers of the establishment of an independent Siberian Government.

SUCCESSFUL BRITISH RAIDS.
LONDON, Aug. 5.
Raiding operations were carried out last night by the British southeast of Arras, near Neville Vitasse, in which prisoners were taken, the war office announced to-day. On the northern front opposite La Bassée the German guns have been very active. They have shown some activity also north of Bethune and between Hazebrouck and Ypres.

TANK STEAMER SUNK.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.
The American tank steamer O. B. Jennings was sunk by a German sub yesterday, about 100 miles off the Virginia coast, and 39 survivors of the vessel's crew have been brought to Norfolk by a naval vessel, the Navy Department was to-day informed. The captain and one boat containing 13 members of the crew is missing. Wireless calls from the steamer, saying that she was being shelled by a submarine, were received yesterday between 11 o'clock and noon. Naval vessels were sent at once to the location indicated, but arrived only in time to pick up the survivors, the vessel having gone down. The Jennings, which was built in 1917, was 7,800 tons net and belonged to the Standard Oil Co.

C. L. B. Camp.

Over 175 persons, including 11 officers, 28 bandmen, and over 30 privates from J. Coy. Bell Island, attended the C. L. B. on Sunday, making the largest attendance in the history of the Brigade. Lt.-Col. R. G. Rendell, O.B.E., was in command. Major Goodridge was second in command, while Captain Quartermaster Williams was a visitor. Notwithstanding the rain in the morning a large number of visitors arrived during the afternoon including Dr. Carmichael of Bell Island, who gave his services to one of the ladies who had been prostrated because of the intense heat. The regular Sunday morning parade was not held because of the rain, but the afternoon service, with Canons Netten and Bolt officiating, was well attended. In a brilliant speech the Lieut.-Colonel moved a resolution favoring the carrying on of the war, which was seconded by Mr. Jas. F. Bancroft, and passed. To-morrow a big field day will be held and His Excellency the Governor will inspect the Brigade. The general public will be admitted free of charge, and a big attendance is expected.

Donation from Labrador.

The Patriotic Fund recently received a cheque for \$325.35 from North West River, Hamilton, Inlet, Labrador. This amount was raised through the activities of the Young People's Club at the head of that bay, during the past winter. The desire of the committee is that \$250 of the amount should be used to support a military hospital cot for one year, and the balance of \$75.35 should be used for other Red Cross purposes at the discretion of the association.

"The Only Way."

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—The London Daily Mail, of recent date, tells us that Conscription has become law in Newfoundland.

After reading your appeal for recruits to fill up the gaps in the R. N. Regiment and the excellent efforts made by the Soldiers' Committee, the only conclusion one can come to is that the Government has done the right thing by endorsing Conscription. The enviable record of the R.N.R. did not for a moment mean that these good boys were to be abandoned for the eligible at home and the regiment left to perish; but, if these men could have been appealed to at the proper time, and in the same manner as they are being attracted to-day, Conscription would not be a necessity for many months to come.

The very word "conscription" seems to most of us undesirable. A man that is called upon to serve should not be ashamed, for there are many excuses for some, whose heart is in the right place, yet hold back for good and sufficient reasons. On the other hand, Conscription is the means of forcing some to do what they would rather shirk, and a speedy method of bringing out of others the best that is in them.

The volunteer has sense enough to know that every man of military age cannot leave the home at once, but he does realize that it is the duty of his fellow-countrymen and brothers to "jump to it" when necessary, and at the first call.

Recently I received through one of your staff several packets of the Evening Telegram, and to say that they were only interesting would be putting it mildly.

I venture the opinion that if larger Dominions were to give, through the press, the same style and amount of publicity to the soldiers' cause as is being carried out by you and the soldiers' committee in Newfoundland, reinforcements for the armies would be assured, and the victory we long for hastened by months.

Adjutant Hurd, S. A.

Among the passengers arriving by the cross-country train yesterday was Adj. H. A. Hurd, of the Salvation Army. The Adj. is a native of Bay Roberts but for twenty years has resided in Canada, and during the greater part of that time has been engaged in Salvation Army work. At the time of the Halifax disaster, the Adj. was in that city and because of his great executive ability and thorough knowledge of the devastated district, was made a member of the various committees representing the Salvation Army. Hurd is accompanied by Mrs. Hurd, a Canadian officer who with Mrs. Hargrove was stationed in charge of the No. 1 Corps, in this city about seven years ago, who also was in Halifax at the time of the disaster and took part in the work of relief.
