terested in the route taken by her.

I would like through the medium
of your paper Mr. Editor to call the
attention of the present Government
to the deplorable and most despicable
state of affairs which exists in this
place so far as public service is con-
cerned. "We are in this place," as a
prominent passenger by the Susu re-
marked a little while ago, "away back
in Moses' time"

By Public Service I mean the con-
veyance of Mails, Freight and Pas-
sengers. This the public claim by
right but treated as we are we receive
it only occasionally by accident,
haphazard and chance.

I write as a loyal citizen of Joe
Battis Arm and as one interested in the
welfare of its people. Understand me
gentle readers when I say Joe Battis
Arm I mean Barr'd Islands as well.
As you will understand Joe Battis Arm
and Barr'd Island are separated by a
narrow neck of land and when we
speak of Joe Battis Arm we mean
Barr'd Island as well.

Imagine — Premier Cashin — Joe
Battis Arm only 5 miles from Fogo
almost within shouting distance and
Fogo receiving four boats weekly and
Joe Battis Arm and Barr'd Islands two
