## Stars Defeat Guards.

### NEW TEAM GO DOWN IN FIRST GAME.

The largest gathering at any of this year's League games saw the Methodist Guards Comrades go down to defeat before the Stars last night, the score being 3 goals to 1. The game was a disappointing one as this time there was no excuse for poor football, the weather conditions being excellent and the field dry. To a certain extent the combination was indulged in but it was not, as a rule, the combination which follows upon good judgement. The idea that a great many players seemed to have was that they must immediately get rid of the ball and, with some faint notion in their heads of the position in which the man they wish to pass to should be, they send the ball in that direction. Free kicks were again too numerous by far and two penalties were awarded. The season evidently intends to create a record in the matter of penalties, for five have been awarded in only three games. The Stars played a fast game throughout, but seemed to place more reliance on hard kicking than on combined runs. The team is a very hard one to play against, containing as it does, so many veteran and experienced footers. Both the Harts played excellent games and Walsh in goal saved some difficult shots. The M.G.C. contains practically all the best men of the Collegian team and showed last night that it is capable of doing some excellent work during the season. The combination played at times was quite good but the forwards were not effective in front of goal. Quick played a splendid game at centre half and besides feeding his forwards well, did some fine dribbling on his own.

**THE FIRST HALF**  
was not a very interesting one. Although the Guards showed a slightly superior combination, the Stars forced things from the start. For a time play became very wild and scrappy and it was not until 22 minutes after the start that W. Hart scored from a mix-up consequent on a corner against the Guards. The next few seconds saw the scoring of one of the quickest goals ever obtained in a League football game. From the centre the Stars rushed the ball down field and before the Guards had recovered from the suddenness of the attack Adams had placed the ball behind Noseworthy for the Star's second goal. Barely three minutes later Adams again scored as the result of fumbling on the part of two of the Guards back division who contrived to get in one another's way. Shortly afterwards, following a free kick, a penalty was awarded the Guards and Quick placed a stinging ground shot behind Walsh for the Guard's first goal. There was no further scoring during this half.

**THE SECOND HALF**  
opened with the Guards on the offensive with the wind behind them. Failure to combine at the last moment lost them several opportunities for scoring. For the first twenty minutes of the half they had things practically all their own way but all attempts at scoring were ineffectual. A second penalty was awarded to them but Quick, who took it, put the ball straight into the goalkeeper's arms. Free kicks next followed one another in quick succession, and it seemed as if the referees were giving a performance on the whistle, so great was the necessity for blowing it continuously. In the last few minutes the Stars broke away and attacked their opponent's goal but did not score again. It is hoped that to-night's game will be an improvement on the three previous ones.
