COMMUNISTS RIGHT ON THEIR JOB Tiflis, Soviet Republic of Georgia, (By a Staff Correspondent of The Associated Press)-The Soviet Govern-

ment here is much more active than that of Moscow. It is a case of the new broom that sweeps clean. It has been supposed that, since the destruction of the democratic Georgian Republic by the Eleventh Red Army, last February, the Government here was of the kind jocularly called "ersatz" in Germany, that is, a sort of harmless substitute for the real thing.
