LADY SQUIRES PRESENTS PRIZES.

Over 5000 spectators were present at the second annual Dominion Sports at the Prince's Rink last night. The sports were organized by the C.C.C. Boat Club and the programme was varied and interesting. Every item was keenly contested and in very few cases did the winner have an easy task in defeating the other competitors. The five mile race was one of the most interesting of the events. Twelve competitors entered, all getting away well. For the first half mile the runners kept close, but going into the first mile they began to spread out, and O'Toole, who took the lead from the start, began to draw away and kept a safe lead all through. He was followed by Thomas, who finished second, about three quarters of a lap behind, with Taylor third. O'Toole's time for the five miles was 25.57 3-5, which, considering the condition, was a creditable showing. The one mile for juniors was a splendidly run race. Bayly, the winner, is a plucky youngster, and gives promise of becoming a first class runner. Much interest was aroused by the basketball game. Very little of this fine game has been played here and last night's exhibition will do much to create interest in it. Lady Squires presented the prizes after the sports had been concluded, and she congratulated the winners on their excellent showing. Mr. P. F. Collins, President of the Boat Club thanked Lady Squires for her kindness in being present. During the evening the C.C.C. Band was in attendance and rendered many delightful selections. Soviet Rule in Georgia.

COMMUNISTS RIGHT ON THEIR JOB

Tiflis, Soviet Republic of Georgia. (By a Staff Correspondent of The Associated Press)—The Soviet Government here is much more active than that of Moscow. It is a case of the new broom that sweeps clean. It has been supposed that, since the destruction of the democratic Georgian Republic by the Eleventh Red Army, last February, the Government here was of the kind jocularly called "ersatz" in Germany, that is, a sort of harmless substitute for the real thing. While in Soviet Russia, the Red flag and the bayoneted Red soldier are going out of style, these two attributes of new freedom are much in evidence here. Automobiles whiz along, bearing red banners, these banners are likewise flown from many public buildings and passes are strictly examined on trains by shaggy persons armed with knife and pistol, which every true-blue Communist has a right to wear.

Strange persons, probably intent on pocket-books and forgotten or mislaid baggage, represent themselves as members of the (committee against counter-revolution) Cheka, when interrupted. This is quite a pastime with young roughs. On the contrary, in greater Russia, the Cheka is a gunshoe affair, and when it takes anything, it does so when nobody is looking. It covers its trail even when it makes arrests so thoroughly that the after relatives of the arrested are left in doubt. Here, when the Cheka makes an arrest and later executes, near relatives are broadly informed, when they bring food to the prison, that the person in question no longer needs food, and they had best discontinue their visits.

One of the latest performances of the Soviet here was to start a brand new kind of finance. It set out to reform the currency and improve exchange and general commercial conditions, and took the short cut of arresting 700 of the leading merchants of the country. They were told they would be shot within a week unless they made a contribution of 25,000,000,000 rubles to the "sanitation fund." They were short half this sum, about \$200,000 in real money. For the other half a committee was released to visit the Near East Relief where the sum was asked for in the form of a loan. As the loan was not made, the merchants returned to prison, and were later released, after giving promissory notes to pay the sum.

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World's Cheapest Steel.

Great Works for India: Cammell Laird's New Project.

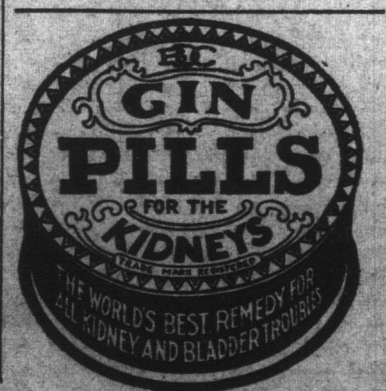
The recent registration in India of "The United Steel Corporation of India, Limited," with a capital of 20 crores of rupees, by Messrs. Bird & Co., of Calcutta, and Messrs. Cammell Laird & Co., of Sheffield and London, may be considered an event of great importance to the future of the iron and steel industry in the East, it being proposed to establish as soon as possible works on a large scale near the deposits of iron, coal, and limestone in India.

Iron ore of the highest quality, fluxes of suitable character, and excellent cooking coal occur close together in vast quantities in Bihar and Orissa. The cost of these at the works is very greatly below what has to be paid in other steel-producing countries. There are upon main railway lines suitable sites for works, with abundant water supply within easy distance of the deposits, all of which are, or will shortly be, served by branch line railways. The combination of these factors with labor facilities indicates that India will be in the position of being able to produce the cheapest steel in the world.

What is a billion? The reply is very simple—a million times a million.



lion. This is quickly written and quicker still pronounced. But no man is able to count it. You count 100 or 170 a minute; but let us suppose you go as far as 200, then an hour will produce 12,000; a day 288,000; and a year or 365 days (for every four years you may rest from counting during leap year) 105,120,000. Let us suppose, now, that Adam at the beginning of his existence had begun to count, had continued to do so, and was counting still; he would not even now, according to the usually supposed age of our globe, have counted near enough. To count a billion he would require 9,512 years 34 days 8 hours and 20 minutes, according to the above rule. Now, supposing we were to allow the poor counter 12 hours daily for rest, eating, and sleeping, he would need 19,024 years 69 days 10 hours and 40 minutes. In Canada, however, a thousand millions is usually called a billion.
