

## Notice to Milk-Dealers.

The attention of milk-dealers is called to the following section of the Regulations respecting the Production and Sale of Milk:

"All milk or cream sold in bottles shall be bottled in the milk-house or dairy. The bottles shall be sealed with suitable caps or covers immediately after filling, and shall be delivered unopened to the consumer. Cans shall not be opened in the streets except while the milk is being poured into the consumer's receptacle."

"Milk while being transported through the streets shall be properly covered so as to prevent contamination from dust, dirt and flies."

This section will be strictly enforced.

### St. John's Municipal Council. PUBLIC NOTICE.

WHEREAS under and by virtue of Section 155 of the St. John's Municipal Act 1921, power was given to the St. John's Municipal Council to make Rules, Regulations and By-laws amongst other things in relation to motor cars used for hire in the city, the following Rules and Regulations were adopted at a regular meeting of the St. John's Municipal Council held the 16th day of October, A.D., 1924:

(1) A distinguishing badge provided by the Council at the cost of the owner indicating that the car is licensed for hire shall be fixed on all motor cars used for hire in the city.

(2) Any motor car driver whose car has not been registered as bona fide for hire soliciting or accepting fares for driving shall be guilty of an offence under these regulations and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars or in default thereof to imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

## UNION PACIFIC.

Pres. Gray Says October Loadings About Equal Last Year's, Though Gross Less.

N. Y.—"October gross will probably be behind last year, although number of cars loaded and received from connections will closely approximate October, 1923," says Pres. Gray of Union Pacific.

"This is due to the freezes of last spring which materially reduced fruit crops of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and water shortage which reduced grain yields in the same states. Against these conditions have been the enormous grain crops in Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado, which have made loadings high, but the short-haul nature of the business has not increased revenues correspondingly. This situation will affect in nearly a like degree gross earnings the balance of the year."

"The operating department continues to keep transportation expenses well in hand. Last year was a heavy one on way maintenance, but so far this year there has been a reduction of only 1 p.c. Equipment expenses are much lower, as was to be expected, since a year ago that item was still abnormally large. Power was never in better condition, and cars never went into winter in better shape."

## Reducing Transportation Costs.

"Net ton miles for September increased 6.8 p.c. over September, 1923, while freight train miles decreased 10.8 p.c. and freight locomotive miles decreased 13.3 p.c. Ratio of transportation expenses to gross decreased from 27.1 p.c. to 26.4 p.c. last month, compared with last year. A better relative showing would have been made but for the material decrease in passenger receipts, which does not admit of corresponding reduction in service."

An approximation of October earnings is difficult, Mr. Gray said, because of uncertainty of traffic. The month's traffic is depending on perishables, and while movement of grapes is almost as heavy as a year ago, tonnage of apples, prunes and pears is off and final grape tonnage will determine to what extent it will offset the perishables movement. The road has a 30 to 35-day car supply, considered normal at this time of year.

A source of satisfaction has been the settlement within the past two weeks of a new wage scale for the system's mechanical crafts, known as the Mechanical Employees' Association of the Union Pacific system, which succeeded the shop crafts union two years ago.

## Shopmen Sign For Two Years.

Under the new wage agreement members of the association have been granted an increase affecting 12,000 men. The increase is almost negligible so far as the road is concerned, an increase of \$50,000 a year, and was arrived at after conference between the road and company union officials. The new scale will stand for two years and provides that an unskilled employee will be paid rate and one-half for time worked over eight hours. Formerly overtime was paid for only after 10 consecutive hours' work. All carmen, machinists, sheet metal workers, helpers and apprentices are placed in one class. Increases are granted according to length of service, and near the close of apprenticeship a workman will receive pay nearly equal to that of a first-class mechanic.
