An Incident of the Seal Fishery

FIFTY YEARS AGO.

Now that our hearty sealers are preparing for their annual voyage, I crave space to record an incident of over fifty years ago, of which I had personal knowledge. On March 1st, 1862, the veteran seal kiler, Captain Samuel Winsor, grandfather of Capt. W. Winsor, M.H.A., with 35 men, sailed for the icefields in the brigantine "Mary Jane", 64 tons. When about 15 miles from Cape Frels the two masts were carried away. Capt. Sam managed to get his vessel in tide water and sank her back to Grand pond, arriving on March 6th. Two new spars were made, and the vessel was again under sail as a brigantine on March 12th. On March 25th, Capt. Winsor was again back to port with 2,500 seals stowed down. Rejoicing over their success one of the crew, Job Carter, had his leg broken through an accident to a small cannon which he was firing.

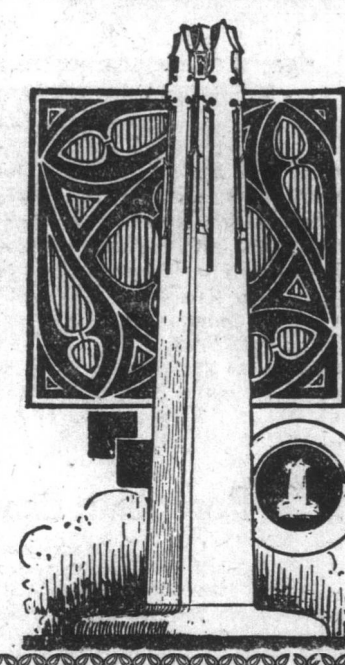
