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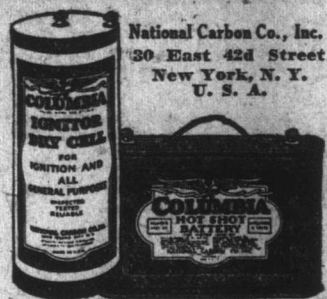

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**Kinematics**

The age in which we live has given birth to a most alarming ailment; an ailment which attacks those who should be in the most perfect flower of life, avoiding in its stride only the very young or the very old; its ravages are without parallel in the catalogue of disease, and it claims more victims than do ten other ailments combined.

Kinematics is an ailment of the mind, and its agent is ordinarily quite harmless, as this bacillus can only multiply under specific conditions.

The sum total of our knowledge of these conditions, implies in short, that the victim of Kinematics must unfortunately be the possessor of a weak mind. A strong mind is too tough for the little brute which causes the condition known as Kinematics, and he has to fly about until he comes across the most suitable person with a mind of the soft variety; then he builds a snug nest, and after taking unto himself a wife, settles down with his countless progeny, to an easy life, living on the "fat of the land" as it were, fattening on the rich pasture lands, which like unto another John Cabot, he has discovered.

Important investigation of recent years has at last isolated the Kinematics germ or Kinematics bacillus, and I am able to give a few facts and so forth, about the Kinematics bacillus in its native haunts.

It would appear that with the average male or female, the Kinematics condition is a very gradual one at first, but the final stages are rapid in extremes. The only place where the complaint is contracted, is at the Moving Picture theatres. But as we go further into the problem, we notice that as the patient gets older, his or her ideas change as a natural consequence; and at the age of fifteen or sixteen, the active changes taking place in the body, favors a more active interest in such things as sport, exciting literature, and so we find in the "movie" line, he or she is following breathlessly some knight of the stetson, perhaps Mr. Mix or Mr. William Hart, who entertain thousands without the slightest harm to ninety per cent.

But the youth or maiden who is subject to Kinematics, is compelled to imitate the actions of some screen actor or actress who has been playing parts in Wild West or Detective photoplays. This is a strange force which compels this, something perhaps akin to the force which pulled Mr. Newton Apple towards the ground.

Passing from those stages which I have endeavored to describe, the patient reaches the last phase of Kinematics, this is known as the Passive or Latent stage, in which human interest plays the controlling part. Here the Kinematics has worked up to that "consciousness which man calls Love," and the love making of the screen is greedily followed by the poor victims of the Kinematics bacillus.

Look about, how many of our friends and acquaintances are Kinematic. This one tries to laugh like

Valentino, that one has an idea she is Gloria Swanson, and otherwise sound minds are spoilt wondering what so much of Hollywood would do in such and such a case. That handsome fellow would be a decent sort if he hadn't obsessed himself with the air of a paid artist who has to act rakish, and we know of girls who would be at better advantage if they got rid of the idea that they are born "Vampires," and that all men are their prey. The days of actual realism in life has gone maybe. Most of us don't live our lives, we act them; it seems such a pity.

No "Lost Continent" in the Pacific Ocean

Scientists Scout Idea of Former Existence of Body of Land.

HONOLULU, Nov. 24.—"Lemuria," "Mu," and all the other hypothetical vast land areas forming "lost" Pacific continents, like the lost Atlantis of ancient European imagination, receive no credence on the part of Dr. Francis Xavier Schaffer, noted geologist of Vienna, now travelling in the Pacific area, and the Orient. Dr. Schaffer is backed up in his opinions also by the scientists at the Bernice P. Bishop Museum of Honolulu.

Though no land areas of continental size ever existed in the Pacific, Dr. Schaffer stated, there are regions or movable zones where emergence and submergence are constantly in progress.

"Such a line," he said, "goes all around the Pacific and connects the Antarctic continent with the continents of the southern hemisphere. It is easy, too, to see that the northern continents may more than once have been connected by way of the Bering strait and by the rising of the relatively shallow sea bottom between Greenland and Europe."

Dr. Herbert E. Gregory, director of the Bishop Museum, disagrees with the theory advanced by Dr. J. Macmillan brown, chancellor of the University of New Zealand, who claims that the Pacific islands are the remnants of a once great empire that collapsed into the ocean in a series of cataclysms.

"Geological evidence," said Dr. Gregory, "gives no proof that there ever was a large area of land in the central Pacific. No rock has been found which could be considered part of an old continent. The only way that geologists will ever be able to make a real test of these theories will be by an extensive system of borings which must extend through the coral and the comparatively new levels of the islands, and also by a carefully planned sounding of the Pacific Ocean."

"The lost continent theory cannot be substantiated by botanical discoveries," said Dr. Forest B. H. Brown, botanist of the Bishop Museum. "In the Hawaiian Islands, for instance, over 80 per cent. of the plants with net-veined leaves occur nowhere else in the world. Had Hawaii been a part of a continent of which the other Pacific islands were also parts, one would expect more plants in common to all."

Condemned Russian Prelate Reaches America

Archbishop Cleplak Arrives in New York and is Given Tumultuous Reception—His Address to the Welcoming Delegations.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Archbishop Cleplak, former ranking prelate of the Catholic Church in Russia, once condemned to death by the Bolsheviks, but subsequently released after a term of solitary imprisonment as a result of protests from all over the civilized world, arrived on the Leviathan Tuesday, November 10. Although he had expressed a desire that there should be no formal ceremonies of welcome he was given a tumultuous greeting from the crowd of several thousands gathered at the pier to meet him. The welcoming crowd included delegates representing Polish organizations in Chicago, Detroit, Philadelphia, Buffalo, and Baltimore.

Holds Reception on Pier.

Before the Archbishop left the pier an informal reception was held in the large waiting-room. Monsignor Michael J. Lavelle, Rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral here, made a short address of welcome on behalf of Cardinal Hayes. Other speakers who also expressed sentiments of cordial welcome were the Rt. Rev. J. C. Plagens, Auxiliary Bishop of Detroit; George Swinski, President of the Polish Welfare Council; the Rev. Stanislaw Ryskiwicz, of Jamaica, L.I.; the Rev. B. Celichowski, of Milwaukee; Dr. A. W. Rusin, of Brooklyn; and Dr. E. Smykowski, of Bridgeport, Conn. Dr. Francis Szubenski, Rector of St. Clements Church here, was chairman of the reception committee for New York; and the Rev. John Sobieszczy was chairman of the delegation from Chicago. Sisters of the Resurrection and of the Immaculate Conception were also on hand to greet the Archbishop and there was a large delegation from the Catholic Club of New York.

The Archbishop replied to the greetings briefly, thanking the delegations for their cordiality. He made reference to conditions in Russia only in an indirect way by referring to religious persecutions as follows:

"The Catholic Church withstands all sorts of persecutions, but the Church seems to become stronger because of persecutions. The faith of our people is not disturbed, because some of us are deterred from preaching that faith. We appear to become more united, we stand as one to combat the causes of persecution."

Purpose of His Visit.

Archbishop Cleplak is in the United States at the invitation of Bishop Gallagher, of Detroit, and Bishop Schembs of Cleveland, who met him in Rome during the past summer, and of Bishop Rhoads of Green Bay, as well as numerous American Catholics, of Polish birth or descent. It was said here that Archbishop Cleplak owes his release from the Russian prison largely to the unofficial intercession of the United States and the British and Italian Governments. One of his purposes in coming to America, it was said, was to express his thanks personally to President Coolidge for this assistance.

During the funeral trial in Moscow in 1923, when the Archbishop and other Catholic ecclesiastics were on trial for their lives—and after which

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one was executed—Archbishop Cleplak made a statement of principles which gained him wide fame. Asked by the court whether he had anything to say before sentence was pronounced, the age prelate after denying the accusations upon which he had been tried, said:

"At this moment I am before an earthly tribunal and soon, perhaps, I shall appear before the one on high."

I have but one desire; that the earthly tribunal be just toward me and that the heavenly tribunal be equally merciful."

Thursday morning, Nov. 12, the Archbishop attended the Solemn High Mass in the Chapel of the Convent of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart, making the beginning of a four-day celebration in honor of St. Madeline Sophie Barat, one of the Saints canonized during the present Holy Year.

The Archbishop remained in New York for a few days before going to Washington.—Catholic
