Inspection of the 30th Battalion.

Inspection of the 30th Battalion. The 30th Battalion was inspected this (Monday) forenoon by Lieutenant-Colonel Taylor, Deputy Adjutant General for the London District, on the field adjoining the Great Western Railway Station. Colonel Taylor came on the ground about eleven oclock, when the Battalion being in line presented arms and saluted the commanding officer. He then rode slowly down the front line and up the rear line. The Battalion was then formed into companies, and wheeled and marched in quick time. It was again formed into line, when the men were put through the man-Battalion was then formed into companies, and wheeled and marched in quick time. It was again formed into line, when the men were put through the manual and platoon exercise by Maj. Clarke. The Battalion was then formed in quarter distance column, deployed to the left, formed fours, and then were reformed into line. Several other movements of the same kind were then gone through, and afterwards the Battalion was put through the various exercises in skirmish drill.—
Three companies were thrown out as skirmishers, the other companies supporting on the right and left wings, while two companies were held in reserve in the rear. The companies were then reversed and the same movements gone through a second time. In all these movements the Battalion displayed great proficiency, and gave evidence that they had greatly improved since Battalion drill commenced. The men were in excellent actency, and gave evidence that they had greatly improved since Battalion drill commenced. The men were in excellent trim, their arms and accourtements in splendid order, and altogether the Battalion made a most creditable appearance.—At the close of the inspection, the men were formed into square, when Col. Taylor addressed them as follows:

Officers and men of the 30th Battalion:
—This is the first time I have met you at Battalion Drill, and I am much surprised, and much pleased, at the steadiness with which you go through your drill. Taking into consideration that this is the first time you have met as a Battalion, you do wonderfully well. I do not mean to say that you are perfect, but you do very well, and you are certainly a credit to the District and to the County. The County ought to be, and I think is proud of you. It is highly creditable to the County that it has done so much to encourage you. If all County Councils would support their Battalions in this way there would be no need for any other means being taken to uphold a defence organization.
