ALMOST WIPED OUT.

Fire Nearly Destroys a Village in Quebec.

QUEBEC, Que., Sept. 3.-A disastrons fire occurred in the pretty village of Point-a-Pic, near Murray Bay, yesterday afternoon, which consumed two large hotels and a large number of buildings. The fire broke out in the stores of the Central Hotel, and in a minute the hotel was in flames. The occupants had barely time to escape. Most of the guests lost their belongings. The Central House, Warren's Hotel, Mrs. Joseph Bouchard's cottage, Mrs. Duberger's three cottages, Fred Girard's two houses, David Desbiens' two houses, Francois Talon's two houses, Wm. Tremblay's house, Louis Tremblay's house, Theo Tremblay's house, Joseph Gagnon's house, John Gagnon's house, Flavius Samson's two houses, Mr. Hamel's house and the postoffice are all losers. The loss is placed at about \$80,000, with very little insurance.

BLAZE AT BELLEVILLE. BELLEVILLE, Sept. 3. -A most disastrous fire broke out at 5 o'clock this morning in the store of Haines & Lockett, wholesale sboot and shoe dealers, Front street. The tock is almost a total loss, and the store is completely gutted. Loss, \$42,000. The store was owned by Mr. Haines, senior member of the firm, and insured for \$8,000, which will cover loss. Stock and fixtures were insured for \$36,000.

A FARMER'S LOSS. St. JACOBS, Ont., Sept. 3 .- During the thunder storm yesterday morning the large bank barn of Jacob Troh, two miles west of here, was struck by lightning and totally destroyed with the whole season's crops, two horses, four pigs, two wagons and all the other implementa. Loss heavy; insured for \$1,800.

CHICAGO FLOODED.

Heavy Rains Lo Much Damage to

Property. CHICAGO, Sept. 4 .- This city was visited by heavy rains last night. The sewers became overcrowded, and backing up, discharged the filthy product from the street into almost every big building. In the down-town district the basement restaurant and saloon business was paralyzed, and scores of wholesale houses whose stocks were stored below the surface, sustained heavy losses.

Unearthing the Bodies of the Forest Fire Victims.

Heaps of Charred Trunks Unceremoniously Buried.

Sad Spectacle That Met a Reporter's Eye -The Lives Lost Estimated at 400-Damage in the Millions -Rain Falling.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 3 .- Forest fires in this State are hourly increasing in fury, and nothing but heavy rain can prevent widespread ruin. Fires are raging along the entire line of the Michigan Central from Bay City to Mackinaw. Gagetown is surrounded by flames, and the people are battling to save the town. Gladyn is also threatened with destructoin.

Dulurn, Minn., Sept. 3 .- A relief train returned this morning from a run down the St. Paul and Duluth road, bringing about 250 destitute and blistered people from points along the line at Sandstone. Fifty bodies, most of which have been identified, were found. The work of searching for the dead still continues. Another train is being made up here to carry supplies, clothing and doctors.

HINCELEY'S AWFUL EXPERIENCE. HINCKLEY, Minn., Sept. 3.—The first good description of the great fire that swept away this thriving village was secured today. Saturday afternoon the fire approached, fanned by a strong wind. The smoke grew denser as the day advanced and it soon became as dark as night. About 4 o'clock the wind changed and the residents of the doomed town saw that the flames were bearing down upon them. The fire shot across the town and the people fled in all directions. some three or four acres in extent and three or four feet deep. The largest crowd of people rushed to Grindstone River, a shallow stream, which it was thought would afford protection from the flames. perished. There the relief parties found

TRAMPLED BY THE FLYING CATTLE. Just as the flames were raging fiercest a train arrived over the Eastern Minnesota and 500 people clambered aboard. It was a godsend to the people, who offered up prayers of thankfulness as the engineer sent the train at a rapid speed away from the burning town and back to safety in

Superior. Another party had rushed for the limited on the St. Paul and Duluth, but as the fire cut off their way in that direction they ran to a shallow pond nearby. There they perished. One hundred and five bodies were removed from the pond by the relief com-

mittee. East of the village there was a stagnant pool of rainwater. Over 100 people sought refuge here, and of these only one man is known to have perished. The immense plant of the Brennan Lumber Company, with saw mills, planing mills, stables, and 28,000,000 feet of pine lumber, was wiped out in almost less time than it takes to write it. With the stables were consumed 90 head of horses. The financial loss to this company alone will reach \$500,000, on which there is an insurance of about one-half.

AN AWFUL RIDE.

A United Press reporter boarded the train out of Pine City for Hinckley this evening. Alongside the tracks were scores of boxes filled with bloated and disfigured remains of victims of the fire. The reporter picked his way through the deserted avenues of the village to the cemetery. Rain was pouring down in sheets. At the cemetery, a mile and a half from town, a half dozen men were digging a trench. A heap of bodies lay on a knoll in the middle of the cemetery. There were 96 neked bodies of men, women and children, scorched, blackened, distorted, bowels and brains protuding, hands clutched in their final agonies, hair singed from the heads. old, young and middleaged, all in a promiscuous heap. In another corner of the cemetery were 45 more bodies covered

with quilts. A large majority of these lest were Scandinavians. Reports continue to come in from the vicinity of Skunk Creek of additional discoveries of burned victims. The total in this vicinity will reach fully 400 dead when returns are all in.

BIG FIRES STILL RAGING. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 4 .- Trainmen of the Northwestern Railroad from the reservoir having been nearly exhausted on north report a number of forest fires along the line from Commonwealth to Menominee. At Springville, Mich., a forest fire was raging, and at the time the train came through a portion of the town seemed to be in danger. On the northern section of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, between Ontonegon and Channing, in Michigan, communication is interrupted. No definite reports are received in consequence, but it is believed that many of the lumber camps have suffered greatly. For a distance of 40 miles along the railroad between the points named there are large lumber camps and mills, and it is believed some of them were destroyed. This Afternoon's Telegrams-Heartrend-

be running for some time. RAGING IN NEW YORK. BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 4. - Forest fires are raging in portions of western New York. In Chautauqua county the flames are sweeping through meadows, woods and farms, reducing to waste everything in their path. Pickets are posted to announce the advance of the fire, but its velocity is such that the families have barely time to escape before their property is enveloped in flames. Near Falconer the farmers have had to organize a bucket brigade to keep the flames from burning their houses and barns, but notwithstanding this several

farms have been laid waste. In Erie county, in the vicinity of Windom, a forest fire is raging and unless rain comes soon great damage will he done. The fire started in the underbrush and spread with frightful rapidity. Farmers have turned out in a body to plow the surrounding land and endeavor to check the progress of the flames.

OUT OF THE GRASSHOPPERS INTO THE FIRE.

DUNKIRK, N. Y., Sept. 4 .- The fierce forest fires now raging south of here threaten disaster to everything in its path. Already thousands of dollars worth of property has gone up in smoke, and the work of destruction continues unchecked notwithstanding the vigorous efforts of hundreds of men, women and children who are fighting the flames day and night. This morning the flames reached point just south of Fredonia, and every available man in the village and surrounding country in fighting the fiery demon. The village is practically without fire protection, the water in the account of the long continued drought, and should the fire gain headway the entire town would be wiped out.

Farmers are in a terrible predicament. Those who escaped the ravages of the grasshopper plague are now having their season's crops destroyed by fire. TWO TOWNS WIPED OUT.

LITTLE FALLS, Minn., Sept. 4. A forest fire has destroyed Curtisand Cushing, a few miles west of here. The loss at Cushing wat about \$35,000; at Curtis the loss was abou \$25,000.
