NOT CAPTURED YET

lla Tufts' Description of Her Assailant Will Materially Help the Officers of the Law-She Saw Him Again on

County Detective Ward is still working on the London East assault case. but so far he has made no arrest. The description given by little Ila Tufts, of her assailant is as follows: He was a young man about 20 years old, about 5 feet 5 inches tall, clean shaven, with black hair and two upper front teeth missing. He was dressed in a black suit and wore a black fedora hat. His bicycle was black enameled. The assault was committed on Wednesday afternoon, and on the following morning the little girl again saw and re-cognized the man. She was walking north on Rectory street, and when near the chemical works, and between the G. T. R. main line and switch, she saw this man riding south towards her. On catching sight of the girl he at once turned and rode north again. A moving freight train prevented the girl from following him, and when the train had passed he was out of sight. On the afternoon of the assault, the handlebars of the man's bicycle were turned down, but on the following morning they were turned up. WELCOME GREEN

Indications of Better Conditions for the British Forces.

Budget of Interesting News From Lord Roberts-The Commander Has Changed His Headquarters.

London, Aug. 25 .- Lord Roberts has left Pretoria, and has fixed his headquarters at Wonderfontein, the second station west of Machadodorp, where the bulk of the Boers in arms are supposed to be. Wiring from there on Aug. 24

"Buller reports the Boers laid a trap for his cavalry, Aug. 23, opening with several guns at fairly short range. The English guns silenced the Boers, but when the firing ceased, and the pickets were being placed for the night, by some mistake two companies of the Liverpool Regiment advanced 1,500 into a hollow out of sight of the main body, where they were surrounded by the Boers, and suffered severely."

The Liverpools lost ten men killed and Capt. Plumer, and 45 wounded. In addition they had 32 men missing.

THE EXECUTION OF CORDUA. London, Aug. 25. - A special from Pretoria, dated Aug. 24 gives details of the execution on Friday of Lieut. Cor-dua of the Transvaal Artillery, convicted by count-martial of breaking his parole in plotting to abduct Lord Roberts, and kill British officers. Cordua walked fearlessly to the garden behind the jail. At his own request he was not bound, and sat in a chair with folded arms. He told Capt. Barchard, commanding the firing party, that he was ready and ten bullets struck him. The body was buried near the spot where the lieutenant fell.

Modern Immigration.

[Chicago Tribune.]

During the fiscal year which ended on June 30 last 341,711 foreigners entered this country through the port of New York. Probably the total immigration for the year will not fall short of 530,-000. The noteworthy and not alto-gether agreeable difference between the 4mmigration of 1900 and that of 30 years ago is that now most of the newcomers are from southern and eastern Surone while they used to be from western and northern Europe.

Of the 314,711 immigrants who landed at New York 99.319 were Italians-all but one-seventh being from the southern and less progressive provinces of the kingdom-96,656 were Poles, Bohemians, Magyars, Croatians, and Slovacs, while 44,520 were entered as "Hebrews," nearly all from eastern Europe. Of English and Irish there were 29,546, and of Germans 23,389. In 1871 out of a total of 321,350 immigrants only 1,208 came from Slavonic countries and only 9,833 from all the Latin countries of Europe, while there were 88,-431 immigrants from Germany and 142,094 from Ireland, England, Scotland and Wales.

The immigration of 1900 is not so well educated as a rule as that of 1871. It cannot do so many things to earn a living. Of those who came over 30 years ago many were soon settled on the land. A large percentage were skilled workmen who usually found employment without difficulty. Too many of the immigrants of today belong to the unskilled labor class, and for that reason and because of their ignorance of the language of the coun try often find it hard to get work.

The tendency of immigrants to take up homes in the cities is more marked than before. There is no longer any free land for them to settle on. There is no growing demand for farm workers. In the cities alone is there an opening for most of the newcomers. It would be better were they scattered all over the country after the fashion of earlier days. The less concentrated they are the more speedily do they become Americanized.

As these immigrants of today are going to settle in the cities and become dependent for their support on the industries carried on there, it is evident that increased responsibilities are being placed on municipal governments. The task of governing satisfactorily a polyglot, semi-American city is far more difficult than that of governing a homogeneous population. There must be a more competent management of the public schools if all the children of the immigrants are to be Americanized. All fads must be sacrificed in the effort to make American citizens out of an increasing number of young foreigners.

Whatever dangers may lie in the rising flood of somewhat undesirable immigration will menace first the cities of the country. They must prepare themselves to combat those dangers
