## THE RUSH TO SELL STOCKS

Weakness Increased by News Regarding the President.

Violent Breaks in Prices of Leading Stocks on the List,

New York, Sept. 24.-Wall street-There was a rush to sell stocks at the opening this morning, yesterday's weakness on account of the money situation being aggravated by the unexpected news that President Roosevelt was under surgical treat-There were violent breaks in prices of 1 to 3 points in the leading stocks on the list. In many cases there were running sales on a downward grade, which showed a spread of as much as a point on simultaneous sales of 1,000 to 5,000 shares. The severest sufferers were amongst the Pacifics, Southwesterns and coalers. The market steadied slightly on secondary quotations, but the liquidation continued in

The liquidation was renewed with violence when the banks resumed the calling of loans, and the money rate soared above 20 per cent. Within a few minutes prices receded to below the opening level, and were generally as much as 1 to 2 points. St. Paul fell 4 5-8, Missouri Pacific 4%, Illinois wanna 5, U. S. Express 5%, Northwestern 6, and so on. It was evident that the large speculative pools were liquidating very freely. The spasm of liquidation had spent itself for the time before noon, and there were rallies running to a point in Missouri Pacific, New York Central and Reading. Bonds were weak in sympathy
