THE ZIONITE DOWIE ABOUT TO START

Accompanied by 3,000 of His Followers.

GOES TO GOTHAM TOMORROW

Novel Feature of Venture Will Be Establishment of Nursery at Zion City.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—John Alexander Dowie and 3,000 of his followers will start Wednesday morning from Zion City on a mission, the purpose of which is to redeem New York. Simultaneously eight and perhaps more trains, specially chartered, will fly across the continent eastward on as many different trunk lines. The first train will leave Zion City at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning over the Pennsylvania Railroad, and will reach New York at 7:30 o'clock Friday morning.

The last train, bearing Dr. Dowie and his immediate retinue, will depart at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and will arrive in New York at 9 o'clock Friday morning.

ACTIVITY IN ZION CITY. There will be an interesting sight at Zion City this morning. The great building in preparation for the trip. Never was an army in war times marshaled more precisely than will be the restoration host when it starts on its pilgrimage of conquest. Members of the host have been drilled and schooled for months. There will be no clash, no delay, no embarrassments of any kind. If the rules laid down by the leaders are strictly observed. Every member of the host knows on what train he is to ride, what seat he is to occupy, in what berth he will sleep.

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ONE HUNDRED PIGS

Presented to Philadelphia Girl as Birthday Present.

Philadelphia, Oct. 12.—One hundred little pigs is the unique birthday gift that twelve-year-old Martha Emma Robinson, of No. 2316 South Tenth street, received from her father.

Martha's father has a country place near the house, where he keeps a few pigs, on which he raises all sorts of farm products. As Martha has always been fond of visiting the place and aiding in the farm activities, her father decided to make her part mistress of it, by giving her ownership of a drove of pigs.

This is to be her capital with which to go independently through life. From its proceeds she will be expected to feed, clothe and educate herself. She will pay board weekly to her mother, buy her own dresses, pay for her amusements; in short, have complete control over her own bank account.

Martha was delighted with the proposition, and immediately proceeded to the farm to look over the stock. She was told that the hundred pigs were worth probably \$500 now, but that "killing time" they would be worth more than double that sum. So she bargained with her father for the care of the pigs until proper time to sell, and obtained a cash loan in advance on them to meet current expenses.

Each one identified. Members of the host will carry identification cards bearing likenesses of the holders. There will be no way for the host to make use of the cheap rates. The pilgrim must first establish his identity with property credentials before he can make the trip, and with the exception of New York he will get the cheap lodging and boarding rates already arranged only by presenting his card of identification.

These cards will be carried by the host, and will be used to secure a case specially made to hold it, together with the railroad and meal tickets. By the sale of these card cases at 15 cents each a considerable revenue has been secured, to be used in paying the transportation of the pilgrims who are without the means.

A Zion commissary will be established in New York. There will be no oysters on the menu. Deacon Frank Cottle, in charge of the commissary, will purchase wholesale, plain food, cook it without lard and serve it to the members of the host at \$5 a ticket.

PROGRAMME OF MEETINGS. The official programme for the visitation in New York has been completed. There will be meetings at Madison Square Garden Auditorium from Oct. 18 to Nov. 1, and in Carnegie Hall from Nov. 8 to Nov. 8 inclusive. There will be three meetings every day except Saturdays, the evenings of which will be given up to stereopticon views of Zion City and its religious, industrial, educational, commercial and social institutions. Addresses on "Divine healing" are to be delivered at the forenoon meetings. Dr. Dowie, Mrs. Dowie and other overseers and ordained officers will pray with and for those who expect to be healed. In the evenings Dr. Dowie will preach "in his prophetic office as Elijah, the restorer."

Dr. Dowie's address on the evening of Oct. 20, it has been announced, will be an answer to Dr. James M. Buckley, whose article, "Dowie Analyzed and Classified," appeared in the Century Magazine a year ago.

WILL ORGANIZE BRANCH.

The four meetings in Carnegie Hall will be specially for the instruction and organization of the branch of the church in New York. Among the distinctive bodies which will go with the restoration host are the staff of overseers, elders, deacons and evangelists, the white-robed choir of 500 voices, Zion City Band, Zion Guard, 1,000 strong, and Zion Legion of Druin Corps.

The last meeting before the departure of the host will be held this afternoon in the tabernacle in Zion City, when Dr. Dowie will have his last word to say upon the crusade, its conduct and possibilities.

Death of Barrels. Brighton, Ont., Oct. 12.—The scarcity of apple barrels in this section is becoming a very serious matter. The coopers cannot fill more than half of their orders, claiming there is not enough stock to keep their workmen busy. Barrels are being imported from Western Ontario but not in very large quantities as the price is very high. The price of barrels has jumped from last year's mark of 32 cents to the price of 50 cents paid at present. The result will be that a great many apples in this section and Prince Edward will be frozen on the trees before barrels can be secured to pack them in, and the crop is unusually heavy in these sections.
