SAME OLD STORY FROM LEGISLATURE

Another Fifteen Minute Session and No Business.

ROUTE OF TEMSKAMING ROAD

Inquiries as to Change of Plans - Grassy Point Lease-Motions and New Bills.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, April 6. - Today's sitting of the House did not exceed the fifteen minute limit, which seems to have become chronic with the new Government. The business transacted was purely formal, consisting of a couple of inquiries and the introduction of half a dozen bills.

Tomorrow's session will be the customary Friday get-away, while Monday's sitting will also be brief. The House will settle down to serious business on Tuesday when Provincial legislation will be taken up to prove that the Province is on the verge of bankruptcy, a fact only averted by the election of a "progressive and honest government."

Mr. Hoyle moved for an order of the House for a return of copies of all correspondence, papers, documents, proposals and memoranda between the Government or any department thereof and the James Bay Railway Company, or any person or persons, relating to the route of the James Bay Railway, from Jan. 1, 1904, down to April 1, 1905, both days inclusive.

In doing so he stated that no data had yet been submitted to the House in accordance with the James Bay Railway act, although it was provided that the route was to be subject to the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council and the ratification of the Legislature. The late Government had not submitted any information as to route as laid down in a profile plan submitted to the Dominion Government, would be followed, subject to certain deviations on account of grades.

The House had thereupon approved of the bill, but to the surprise of the members it had been amended after the recent election that the late Government had issued an order-in-council practically diverting the road from its original route.

Mr. Hoyle requested that the motion stand until the member for East Simcoe (Mr. Tudhope) was present.

Mr. Whitney remarked that it would not take long to bring down the documents upon the motion passed.

The motion therefore stands until Tuesday.

Grassy Point Lease.

Hon. Mr. Fay, replying to Mr. McCole's question as to the lease of Grassy Point, in Lake St. Clair, said that it was now leased under the authority of the Province, but by the Dominion Department of Indian Lands. The Dominion Government had not yet decided upon the proposed lease, and the Province had not yet decided upon it. It was the intention of the Government to bring the matter up to see if the lease could not be canceled by the Province.

Students' Residence.

Hon. Mr. Fyne informed Mr. Harcourt that in January a residence for women students of 'Varsity had been opened, accommodating quite a number of students. The Government had not yet considered the providing of further accommodation.
