The large deposits of iron so far discovered were not suitable for steel rails, but such deposits doubtless existed, and the offering of a bonus of, say, \$50,000, to the prospector who discovered such iron, would be money well spent. The bonus on copper was entirely insufficient. A straight bonus of \$100,000 should be given to a company to aid in building a smelter. The same argument would apply in the case of nickel. Canada produced 75 per cent of the world's nickel, yet it all went to the United States to be refined. The Province would be repaid the outlay within five years, even if the cost was \$1,000,000, as the establishment of a smelter would double the number engaged in the mining industry in North-

ern Ontario. Hon. Mr. Cochrane pointed out that the Dominion Government already bonused the iron industry. He disapproved of the payment of this bonus on from foreign ores. A smelter built with Government aid might never do any smelting after it was erected.
