PARKHILL PEOPLE SEE BIG SAWING MATCH

Some of the Best Sawyers in Ontario Among the Contestants.

Parkhill, March 19.—A lively sawing match was held in the yards of the Franklin House, Parkhill, on St. Patrick's Day, when over 500 people were present to witness the four events. Some of the best sawyers in Western Ontario were present, notably Kimball Brothers, of St. Thomas, and Gilmore and Maguire, of Mooreville. Daniel Brothers, of Lobo, the log was a hard maple, 22 inches at the butt and 19½ inches at the top. For the open improved race first prize of two new improved Racer saws and \$10, donated by Shurley & Dietrich, of Galt, was won by Kimball Brothers, of St. Thomas, in 51 seconds; second, 55 seconds. The second prize went to Daniel Brothers, of Lobo, in 55 and 45 seconds. The third prize went to Gilmore and Maguire, of Mooreville, in 61½ and 46 seconds. McLeod Brothers were just half a second behind in 108 seconds, Mulders Brothers being fifth in 127 seconds.

In the old man's class, over 50 years, the first prize went to Retan and Eberly in 51 seconds; second, the prize was divided between Simpson Brothers, and Baxter and Niblock, each making the cut in 62 seconds; Johnson and Tibbitt being fourth in 68 seconds.

In the young men's class under 20 years, the first prize went to Simpson Brothers, in 54 seconds; second to Retan Brothers, in 57 seconds. The third was Miller and Simpson in 71 seconds and McCandless Brothers in 91 seconds. The timekeepers were B. Harrison, of London, and C. P. Barrett.

The funeral of the late E. A. MacLeod, of Englehart, took place on Monday. Mr. MacLeod was in business in Parkhill for a number of years under the name of D. N. MacLeod & Company. He left here four years ago and located in Englehart, erecting three of the first buildings in that place. Mr. MacLeod was the postmaster of Englehart and owned considerable real estate in the north country. He was a member of the municipal council of that place and was highly esteemed. He leaves a widow and a son, six months old.

The death of Mrs. Annie Clark, aged 81 years, a resident of Parkhill for over 30 years, took place on the 18th. She was born on the Centre road of West Williams.

ANOTHER BRUTE APPEARS IN THE POLICE COURT

Ill Treated Sick Wife and Little Daughters—Pathetic Case Before P. M. Love.

Another shocking case of brutality was divulged in the local police court this morning, when a London man faced Magistrate Love on a charge of assault laid by his 15-year-old wife. According to the story told by the little girl in the box, her mother had been ill for a long time, and her father had been drinking heavily and ill-treating the woman and her two little daughters, aged 15 and 8 years.

Recently the wife has been very ill, and on March 11, the girl said, her father came home drunk and insulted a doctor and forbade him attending his wife again. Then the man became very violent and threatened to cut his wife's throat and also her daughters.

That night he slept with the axe and a big hammer under his pillow, and threatened to instantly kill anyone who left the room. Later he took the 8-year-old girl and looked her in a dark and cold cellar.

A Bad Actor.
While walking around the house with a piece of wood in his hand, he let it fall and a big splash in his foot. Thereupon he became very violent again. His conduct was such that his wife went temporarily insane, and while she was in this condition he stole \$15 from her, saying he would need it to pay a fine if he was arrested.

"This is a very sad case," said Magistrate Love. "You were a decent young man until you began to drink. If I can do it you will never return to that house again. I don't want to have a tragedy in this city. My experience is that men of your sort go from bad to worse, and when they start abusing their unfortunate wives they are likely to do anything. Owing to your drinking habits a fellow-railwayman had to work overtime while you were drunk, and while doing so was killed. That is a sad thing for you to reflect on. I find you guilty and remand you to jail for a week, while I consider what to do with you. If you do not certainly reform, you will not be released."

The woman is at present in St. Joseph's Hospital, where she has to be kept in perfect quiet.
