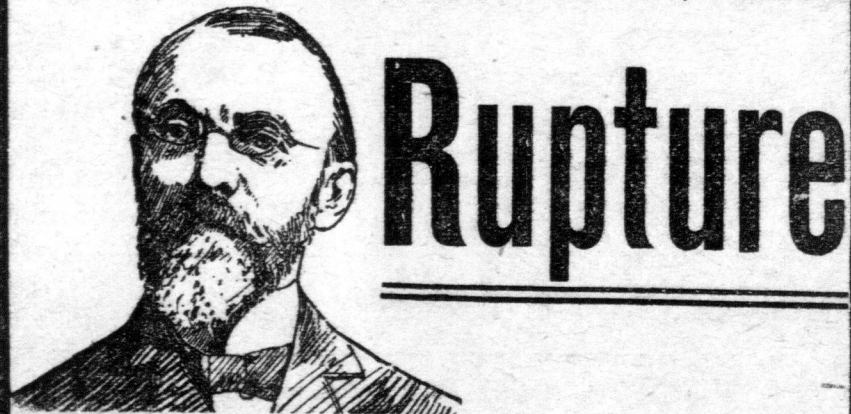

Most Enjoyable Thanksgiving Day

Weather Ideal, Attractions Many

People of London Spent a Very Pleasant Holiday Yesterday.

Never was there a much finer day than Thanksgiving Day. It was perfect autumn weather, a cloudless sky and plenty of warm sunshine. There was not a bit of chill, but, on the contrary, it was warmer than it has been for many days. Everybody went out—there was no need to stay in. As a result there were many people on the streets taking in the glory of a Canadian autumn day.

A large number went to the woods, and spent the day with the "kids," hunting for nuts, and watching the youngsters enjoying themselves.

A considerable number went driving, the country roads being in good shape, and a drive being a very splendid means of enjoyment.

The football game and other athletic attractions were well patronized, and the theaters report a large business.

The day was quiet in the city. The police were not busy. Drunkenness was not noticeable, and on the whole the day was very quiet. Not an accident is reported.

The churches held the usual Thanksgiving services. More churches than usual held these services, and there was a large attendance at every one of them. Special music was rendered, with the day and its celebration, and were patriotic in many instances.

Holiday traffic was heavy in spite of the rumored scarcity of money. It was a real home holiday, and visitors from afar were many.

There have been few days when there were so many real visitors in the city, except perhaps during some large celebration.

Many Londoners went away, the points of interest being Toronto and Detroit principally.

Hallowe'en Passed Off Very Quietly

Hallowe'en passed off very quietly in London, and very little depredation was committed. The voice of the student was not heard in the land, as most of them went home for the holiday. The youngsters were somewhat tired after the holiday, and did not seem anxious to get out and create a disturbance. A few gangs with the tick-tack and the pumpkin did business as usual, but their hilarity did not last very long.

The gates of the citizens were not removed so far as on former festive occasions, as there was very little doing in that line. It might be stated that front gates and fences are no longer fashionable in London.

Hallowe'en parties were quite numerous and the young people had a good time. It is stated on good authority that the number of young ladies who looked into the mirror to discover their sweethearts was larger than usual.

On the whole, the Hallowe'en of 1907 was as quiet as has been in many years.

THE PROVINCIAL POWER POLICY

The Ontario Government Will Build Transmission Line.

A LOOP LINE FOR THE WEST

Niagara Energy Is To Be Carried to All the Municipalities.

Toronto, Oct. 31.—A conference relative to the present status of the power question as it applies to this city was held at the offices of the hydro-electric power commission yesterday. Hon. Mr. Mackenzie, the chairman, presided. Mr. A. F. Naught, M. P. P., a member of the committee, and Mr. W. K. McLeod, counsel, and Chief Engineer, Sotthmann represented the commission. The city representatives were the members of the board of control, City Council, Fullerton and Mr. William C. Chisholm, city solicitor. Mr. T. C. Meredith, K.C., of London, who has been retained in connection with the agreement between the commission and the Ontario Power Company for the purchase of power at the Falls, and the wording of the contracts on which the municipalities will vote for the raising of money required to carry out their respective responsibilities in connection with the power scheme, was also present.

It is likely that as a result of the conference the board of control will recommend to the city council the framing of a bylaw authorizing the raising of the money necessary for a distribution plant. As the cost of distribution the figures will not be definitely known until the city engineer receives the estimates of Messrs. Smith, Kerry & Chace, to whom the preparation of estimates was entrusted by the city. The firm it is thought, will hand in its report to the city engineer on Saturday. Reports current yesterday were that for a pole system the estimates were in the neighborhood of \$400,000 to \$500,000, and that for a distribution system, largely underground, the cost would be a little over \$1,000,000 for 10,000 to 15,000 horsepower. The idea seems to be that the city should be in a position to have its own distribution plant if the ratepayers wanted it, so that there would be no question of being held at the mercy of a private corporation.

As to the question of transmission, there is no longer any doubt that the Government has decided upon Government-owned lines. The building of them will not be undertaken, of course, until the municipalities have decided their course by vote at the next municipal elections. It was stated to the Globe yesterday that in the event of the various votes showing the acceptance by the municipalities of the formal contracts with the commission, work on transmission lines would be started almost immediately.

Work on the surveys of such of the lines as would serve the municipalities of the western union that have applied to the commission for power is almost completed. The general basis of these surveys, it is understood, contemplates a loop line from Hamilton, which city will soon be furnished with the estimated cost of distributing the power it has asked the commission to supply. West to London the northern portion of the loop will include Guelph, Galt, Stratford and St. Marys, and Woodstock, Brantford and other places will be included in the southern part. Between Hamilton and the Falls there will be a duplicate line, and from Hamilton to Toronto a special line. This loop combination, it is claimed, will do away with danger of breakdown of the service at any of the points named.

The framing of the formal agreement with the Ontario Power Company for the supply of power at the Falls is progressing satisfactorily, and its conclusion, it is thought, will not be subject to much of a delay.

HAU'S SENTENCE COMMUTED

American Professor Found Guilty of Killing Mother-in-Law.

London, Nov. 1.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard says that the Grand Duke of Baden, acting on the advice of the Minister of Justice, has decided to commute the sentence of death passed on Karl Hau, formerly professor of Roman law at George Washington University, Washington, D. C., for the murder of Frau Motur, his mother-in-law, to penal servitude for life.

This decision is regarded as being based on the view that evidence adduced at the trial was not sufficient to justify Hau's execution. Moreover, the grand duke, having just succeeded to the throne, does not wish to begin his reign by signing a death warrant. Hau will shortly be removed to the penal settlement at Bruchsal.
