Money Qualifications Required of Immigrants to Canada.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.-An order-in-council has been passed raising the minimum money qualification of \$25 now required of all immigrants coming to Canada to \$50 for the period from Jan. 1 to Feb. 15. The doubling of the money qualification during midwinter is with a view to restricting as far as possible the arrival of any immigrants without independent means during the period when employment is not easy to ob-The restrictive immigration regulations adopted by the Government early this year have had the desired effect in cutting down immigration by considerably over one-half, and the total immigration for the year will, it is expected, be only a little over 100.000.
