POLICE ARE SEEKING ST. THOMAS CONTRACTOR

A Warrant Out for the Arrest of Robert Navin.

Robert Navin, a contractor, of St. Thomas, left that city rather hurriedly Saturday night, and on Monday morning a warrant was issued for his arrest by Messrs. Ingram & Davey, a hardware firm, with which he had been dealing largely, charging him with receiving goods under false pretences.

Navin, it is said, was for some time a resident of this city, under the name of Nevill, but changed his name on going to St. Thomas.

Navin had a number of large contracts under way, and is under obligation to a number of hardware and lumbermen. His workmen, too, were left without their wages when he departed on Saturday. Navin was to have met with Messrs. Ingram & Davey on Monday to make some settlement on his large indebtedness to them.

A constable was sent here to serve the warrant, but the man had disappeared, and though he was traced as far as Woodstock, where he was completely lost. The police of the border cities have been notified to hold him if he attempts to cross the line. Navin, it is claimed, was in trouble that he was connected with the Metropolitan Manufacturing Company, of this city.

The police here know Navin very well, as about a year ago he was sent down for two months for fraud in connection with some building contracts. He has a long record in England, where he came from, having been sentenced on one occasion to three years in penitentiary for a felony. He was released on parole for good conduct at the end of a couple of years, and shortly afterwards was sentenced to a term of five years for fraud. He was completed and a short time later released again before his five years was sentenced at Totnes to five years in penitentiary for fraud. After serving that term he was released, and came to this country. He had only been here a short time when the English police notified the local officials that a man he was. A short time afterwards he was in trouble here and got two months. Navin left a wife in England, but the police believe that after leaving London he married another woman here, and went to St. Thomas. He is also believed to have been mixed up in an attempt to obtain money from an Owen Sound woman.

UNIVERSITY BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Officers Were Elected—County Council Petitions.

At the meeting of the board of governors Saturday afternoon the officers of the past year were re-elected as follows:

The matter of presenting the petitions of the various county councils asking for Government aid was taken up, and they will be laid before the Legislature at an early date. A strong deputation will probably go down to urge the claims of the university. They are hopeful that a generous grant will be made.

DIED AT LONDON

Former Port Stanley Resident, Mrs. Joseph Truan, Aged 72.

Port Stanley, Dec. 14.—The death took place at London of Mrs. Joseph Truan, aged 72, a former resident of Port Stanley. Deceased had been a sufferer from dropsy. She leaves three daughters and one son, namely: Mrs. S. Giffin, London; Mrs. W. Stacey, and Mrs. D. Graham, Port Stanley, and W. M. Goodhue, of St. Thomas. The body will be taken to the residence of Mrs. Graham here, from whence the funeral will be held on Wednesday.

HARVARD'S NEW CAPTAIN.

Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 13.—Lothrop Withington, of Honolulu, was tonight elected captain of the Harvard football team for the coming year. Withington is 20 years old. Last year he rowed No. 5 on the varsity crew which defeated Yale, and played left guard this fall on the "arsity football team. He is president of the junior class.

BIG CHILIAN FIRE.

Santiago, Chile, Dec. 13.—A disastrous fire occurred last night in the city of Valdivia. Eighteen blocks of buildings were destroyed and thousands rendered homeless. The loss is estimated at about 7,000,000 pesos (\$2,500,000).

CASE AGAINST ED. RYAN DROPPED IN MICHIGAN

Refereed Prizefight When Harry Lewis Killed Mike Ward at Grand Rapids.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Dec. 13.—The case against Edward Ryan, of Detroit, who was the referee in the prizefight between Mike Ward and Harry Lewis, Nov. 13, 1906, when Ward was killed, was quashed today at the request of Prosecuting Attorney Brown Lewis. He pleaded guilty to a charge of involuntary manslaughter soon after the fight and paid a fine of \$1,000.

Mike Ward was well known in London, having boxed here on several occasions.

LEVEL CROSSING CRASH

One Killed and Several Injured at Port Colborne, Ont.

Port Colborne, Dec. 13.—George Daybry, a farmer residing in Wainfleet Township was driving his four sons to school today, when the rig was struck by a Grand Trunk freight train at a crossing five miles west of here. The boys, Joseph, aged 8 years, was instantly killed, and Alonzo, aged 10, was seriously injured.

Mr. Daybry received only slight injuries, and his other boys escaped without a scratch. The horse was killed and the wagon completely demolished.

It is thought that the horse became unmanageable while trying to get across.

WRONG ADDRESS ON THE LETTER

And It Was Opened—Result Was a Case in Court.

Herbert H. Hillier, of the Toronto Photographic Co., "264 Yonge Street."

A letter bearing the above address was carried by a postman to the office of the Photographic Company, Toronto, and was opened by a clerk. The letter was a rival concern, the Toronto Gramophone Company, at 286 Yonge street.

Quoted in the letter, any right to open said letter. Mr. Hillier very decidedly considered it had not, and brought Mr. White to court. The charge against him was "unlawfully opening a postal letter."

He pleaded not guilty. On the question of a letter being a "postal letter," a point of very great difference in the law was brought up.

"Once the letter was delivered to its destination," namely, "Care of the Photographic Co.," it ceased to be a postal letter," having been placed in the hands of the postman. The delivery of any letter at the house of the addressee, however, ends the responsibility of the Postal Department.

His worship's court, however, happily presided over the defendant's case, for under the act, the minimum penalty for tampering with mail is imprisonment for one year. Mr. Hillier's explanation, however, appeared to the magistrate as reasonable, and the charge against him was dismissed.

ILLUSTRATED ADDRESS ENGLISH CATHEDRALS

Rev. R. S. W. Howard at the Memorial Church.

There was a great attendance at the school room of the Memorial Church last night on the occasion of the thirty-sixth anniversary of the church. The Rev. R. S. W. Howard, who acted as chairman, spoke enthusiastically of the splendid response to the request for funds for the renovating of the church. Canon Hughes also spoke in the most optimistic terms of the prospects before the church.

The feature of the entertainment was the illustrated address on the English Cathedral, delivered by Rev. R. S. W. Howard, of Christ Church, Oxford. Mr. Howard showed many beautiful views, and described the scenes presented at the various cathedrals.

During the evening, too, a brief programme was enjoyed. A solo, "Blue Eyes," by Miss Marion Beaumont, and a new dance, "The Hush," by Miss Trevelyan, Smith, and Wilson, which added greatly to the pleasure of the evening.

Refreshments were then served, bringing the evening to a very pleasant close.

ELECTRICITY IS HEALTH

Prof. Andrew McConnell's Lecture Last Evening.

Last night in the Masonic Temple Hall, Andrew McConnell, of Chicago, the noted health scientist, propounded a new theory of human electricity. It is the scientific basis of health. The discourse of Mr. McConnell was most interesting and was listened to with great attention by a large number of people.

Rev. A. K. Birks introduced the speaker, and at the close, Rev. Charles T. Cocking, of Toronto, spoke of the lecture as a very attractive work, and his class is composed of a considerably more than 100 students.

Mr. McConnell dispelled the idea that he is a Christian Scientist, and that the basis of his system is physical and his course a physical one. The mind acts powerfully upon matter, and in this case the brain directs the electric currents of the body to any desired part. He clearly showed that it is as easy for a man to cure disease in his own system as it is to fire an engine. There can be no question that Mr. McConnell will establish a large class of students in London, as he has in Hamilton, Toronto, and other centres.

Ellis Wheeler Wilcox, in the New York American, said some time ago: "The missing link between the school of physicians and metaphysicians has been found. It is a link of pure gold of brilliant color and bright common sense. Andrew McConnell is the missing link. In his six masterly essays he has proven that man is an electric engine, and that he contains in his own body every chemical necessary to produce and restore health. A more logical, simple, convincing argument was never produced."

CRUDE BUT EXPRESSIVE

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—"This memorial is erected today to commemorate the taking possession for the Dominion of Canada of the whole Arctic Archipelago, lying to the north of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, from longitude 60 degrees west to 141 degrees west up to latitude 90 degrees north. Winter Harbor, Melville Island, C. S. S. Arcturion, July 1, 1909. E. Bernier, commander, J. V. Koenig, sculptor."

The above inscription appears opposite a little metal tablet, which has been placed in the corridor leading to the Parliamentary Library. The tablet is of crude sculpture, and has created some amusement. It was executed without proper tools by one of the engineers in the Arctic.
