

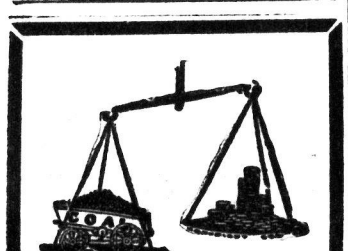

OBJECTION WAS TAKEN TO THIS APPOINTMENT

Ald. Cooper Thought Fireman Bolton Should Be Captain of No. 4 Station.

Ald. Cooper started a flurry at the council meeting last night, when he objected to the appointment of Lieut. Frank Taylor to the rank of captain to take charge of the North End Station. Fire Chief Aitken recommended the appointment to No. 4 committee, who in turn recommended it to the council.

"I want to know how it is that this man is appointed to the rank of captain," asked Ald. Cooper. "He has not been on the brigade any length of time, and here he is appointed over men just as good as he is. I think they are better. I want to know why this is. What right has the chief to appoint a man over the heads of those who have been in the department longer? I know plenty of better men. Perhaps he got the place because some of the others interested for him."

Fire Chief Aitken was called, and informed the council that he had recommended the appointment of Lieut. Taylor, because he was the best man for the position, and was in line for promotion.

Name a Better Man.
"I would like to have Ald. Cooper name a better man than Lieut. Taylor," said Chief Aitken. "I know the men, and as I am responsible, I should select the man I want."

"There is Fireman George D. Bolton, a good man, who has been in the brigade for years," shouted Ald. Cooper. "He is the man for the job, and you cannot say a word against him."

"I took all the facts into consideration when I made the appointment," said Chief Aitken.
