



LONDON NEEDS AN ARENA
TO STAY ON HOCKEY MAP

Local Rinks Are Not Conducive to Championship Teams—Poor Accommodation and Soft Ice a Great Drawback to the Game—Time Something Was Done.

The need of an arena in London has never been felt so keenly before as this winter. There have been hard ice for the game against Collingwood Monday evening, London would now be holding the title of intermediate champion. But there have been an arena the terrific crush of people at the rink's doors would have been avoided and a couple of thousand more persons who were kept from the game because of the poor accommodation offered by the local rink have been able to attend and cheer the boys along.

London has a prominent position on the hockey map and it has been considerably strengthened by the showing of the local intermediates this winter. There is no reason why London could not enter all three series of the O. H. A. if the proper rink facilities were provided.

There have been rumors in the past that an arena will be built "next year," but the years have passed and the same rumors are afloat. London is just a far off from having an arena built as it was ten years ago, unless a united effort on the part of the people who "would like to see one here" is now made.

SHOULD PROVE A SUCCESS.

There is no doubt that an arena would be a paying proposition in this city. Hamilton has made one pay this season and Hamilton is not a hockey town. It has not had an O. H. A. championship team to draw big

gate receipts nor has it had the kind of hockey that the fans like to see. Both Hamilton teams were jokes and the exhibition games that have been played there were nothing out of the ordinary.

An arena with artificial ice, and it seems little use building one unless an artificial ice plant is included in the plans, will not only insure a good season of hockey, but will be a means of attracting games from the outside. Then there is always a chance of having outside teams play sudden death games to settle a district championship. Then exhibition games between the big pro. teams could be played. There are a host of other attractions that could be staged in an arena. A mild winter would mean that many of the O. H. A. district and championship games would have to be decided in the artificial rinks. London would draw from all Western Ontario and Western Ontario is more largely represented in the O. H. A. than any other section.

SKATING WOULD BE BIG ITEM.

The revenue from skating alone should make the arena a paying proposition. With ice from the first of December to the end of March or middle of April, continuously, there are wonderful possibilities for an ice plant in this city. It is nearly time that something definite was undertaken in this respect. London is on the hockey map with a vengeance. Why not keep it there.

MOOSE JAW BEATEN
IN ALLAN CUP GAME

Winnipeg Shuts Them Out by Score of 6 to 0 in the First Game.

Winnipeg, March 11.—Unless they show a remarkable reversal of form over their play of tonight, Moose Jaw team will return without the Allan cup, as the Winnipeggers put them out, 6 to 0, in the first defense of the amateur title. About all that the visitors showed was their ability to check, and in this respect they were artists, but they failed to show anything in the rushing line and seldom had a chance to score.

Any chance the challengers had of scoring was nipped by Jack Putton, who was about the only Winnipegger who played in anything like his usual form. He picked the puck right out of the thick of the visitors' rushes, and time and again rushed the length of the ice, several times dodging the whole team. Pascoe took the count near the finish of the first half, but came back in the second. He finally collapsed after playing 20 minutes of that period, and had to be carried off the ice. He went down twice before finally giving in. McDonald, at left wing, put up a fast game for the visitors, but his shots were never on the goal. Monday's intermediate fixture was by long odds much faster and more interesting. On hard ice Winnipeg should give Moose Jaw a bad drubbing.

CLUB IN ST. KITTS

Strathroy Ballplayer Will Play on the Niagara Peninsula This Summer.

St. Catharines, March 11.—Abbie Johnson, who formerly managed the Guelph Maple Leafs, proposes to transplant a professional baseball team from Franklin, Pa., to St. Catharines as an independent organization. The Franklin team was to have played in the New York and Pennsylvania League this year, but dropped out because of difficulties over the grounds. Johnson has asked for the use of the old St. Catharines lacrosse grounds from the civic park committee for certain days in the week during the coming season, when the grounds are not taken up by other teams. Johnson proposes to play his team in Niagara Falls, Welland, Dunnville and other towns in the district. He expects to close the deal on the 19th.

FORT WAYNE SETS TIME LIMIT
ON SHAUGHNESSY'S RELEASE

Ottawa Club Must Act Quickly in the Matter or Do Without Him.

Ottawa, March 12.—The Fort Wayne Baseball Club, through its president, Claude Varnell, of Wheeling, West Va., has named the final figure that will be accepted for the purchase of Frank Shaughnessy and has informed the Ottawa club a time limit will be set on the deal and negotiations must be completed by a certain date. The final figure is the same as was originally asked last fall, and it appears up to the Canadian League champions to dig down and in over the cash if the big boy is to pasture on the local playground this summer. There is no doubt he is needed here, the Canadian League will be twenty-five per

There was some objection to returning to Chatham this season on account of the fact that the ball field at Recreation Park had no skinned diamond. The advantages of the sulphur baths for conditioning purposes has prompted the Ottawas to return there again. The only kind of practice that will be hampered will be infield work. This Shaughnessy believes, can be made up on the exhibition tour.

BY CIRCUIT PRESIDENT

President Devereaux Officially Announced Revocation Yesterday.

Cleveland, March 12.—In a signed newspaper article appearing today, H. K. Devereaux, president of the grand circuit, officially announces the revocation of the grand circuit rule which would limit the winnings of stake pacers to \$10,000 and stake trotters to \$15,000 before they are compelled to enter classes designated by their records.


