

LIMIT RULE REVOKED BY CIRCUIT PRESIDENT

President' Devereaux Officially Announced Revocation Yesterday. [Canadian Press.]

Cleveland, March 12.-In a signed newspaper article appearing today, H. K. Devereux, president of the grand circuit, officially announces the revocation of the grand circuit rule which would limit the winnings of stake pacers to \$10,000 and stake trotters to \$15,000 before they are compelled to enter classes designated by heir records.


