proceedings. The grand jury is going to hear not merely a grifter, but is considering also the testimony of Herman Rosenthal's relatives and friends that the gambler believed the police would kill him.

Otto Avers, the chauffeur who has been wheeling Becker around town for more than a year, admitted today that he was not a witness to the shooting, but he was before the grand jury that he was asked about this conference, and Avers will be re-questioned.

The discovery that Avers rushed to Becker from the grand jury was made just before Joseph Immerman, a brother of Mrs. Rosenthal, told the grand jury that Rosenthal had told him that he was a gambler, and had described the relations that existed, he said, between the lieutenant of police, the gambler and Jack Rose. Statements made by Immerman as to the profitable dealings of policemen with gamblers will be threshed out by the grand jury.

The Five Accused Men.
This is the description and under-mind history of the five men who are accused by the district attorney and Deputy Commissioner Dougherty of shooting Herman Rosenthal—Dago Frank, Lefty Louis, Whitey Lewis, Gib the Blood, and Harry Vallon. All Gib the Blood, who surrendered early yesterday morning, are at large.

The real name of Dago Frank, "the toughest man in the world," says Vallois, "O'Ferrall, who went from the police department to run a detective bureau of his own, is Frank Muratto. He was born in Italy 26 years ago, and before he went utterly bad worked as a barber on the east side. He weighs about 145 pounds, is of medium build, and has brown hair and hazel eyes. Dago Frank is equally skillful with knife and revolver and has made himself a hero among his kind by his ferocity. He has taken pay wherever he found it, and has boasted of murdering, likely to turn on his own crowd, Dago-Frank has, in the estimation of the underworld, one sterling trait—when he is hired to do a job he does it.

In 1910 he cut a man named Ke-

gan to ribbons at Second avenue and Thirteenth street, O'Ferrall, Duggan, and Kinsler trailed him and laid him by the heel. But Dago Frank had friends with influence, and somehow the gambler believed the police would kill him.

A Remarkable Crook.
The real name of Lefty Louis is Louis Rosenawing. He is about 30 years old and is one of the most remarkable crooks in the country. Lefty sprang from a decent family, a family of money and education. He has retained much of his upbringing and he uses these as tricks.

Lefty is a crack shot with a pistol and quick as a flash of lightning with a knife. Not so long ago he shot up a billiard room run by two brothers named Frank. He was captured and indicted, but somehow the testimony against him petered out and Lefty went free.

Whitey Lewis' history is no less interesting. He has been the pilot of more desperate thugs, but occasionally, when big money was in sight, he has taken a chance himself. He is a brother of Red Lewis, a pickpocket, who is now doing a five-year term in Sing Sing. He is 30 years old, stocky, heavily-shouldered and heavily armed. He is marked by a shock of light hair. A few years ago he was a third-rate prize fighter, but he never had much celebrity as a killer or a thief.

Gib the Blood.
Gib the Blood is Harry Horowitz. He is a strong man, a gorilla, as the East Side boys say. His job for years has been floor manager and bouncer for cheap dives. He had the reputation of being able to break a man's back by bending the victim over his knees. He is known also as one of the bomb

throwers who were hired in the gambling war in the Tenderloin to blow the front out of houses of warring gamblers. Herman Rosenthal suffered from one of these dynamitings. A bomb was thrown into the vestibule of a gambling house Rosenthal ran at Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Sixteenth street, and the Blood, as he is called, went through the underworld, tossed the bomb because he hated Rosenthal.

The record of Harry Vallon, or Harry Vallinsky, his right name, the only one of the five now under arrest, lacks the sharp outlines characteristic of the history of the others. Vallon is a young man, a young man of easy disposition and with no known natural leaning toward murder. Vallinsky's brother was Shoney Mike, now dead, a pickpocket well known to the police. It is believed that Vallon's part was less conspicuous than that of Dago Frank or Lefty Louis. Vallon has not been a desperate fighter and never evidence has shown so far that his part of the plot was to keep watch on Rosenthal's movements and to lure Rosenthal's friends away from the gambler.

GUARD QUEEN'S JEWELS

Portuguese Government to Auction Off \$275,000 Worth of Gems.

Lisbon, July 25.—Fearing a Royalist attempt to seize former King Manuel's grandmother's jewels, the Government put a strong guard over the late Queen Maria Pia's \$275,000 worth of gems. They are to be auctioned today. Collectors and dealers are gathering to bid on the collection.

The collection is to be divided into 267 lots, including several lots of pearls. Many of the gems were marriage gifts to the late queen, some being given by crowned heads. The collection is being sold by order of the State Bank, with which the jewels were deposited some years ago as security for a large state loan.

A FREAK EGG.

New York, July 25.—Many egg collectors were on hand yesterday in Mount Vernon, when a monster egg, which was laid last week by a Plymouth Rock hen

owned by W. F. Bollen, of 247 West Lincoln street, was opened by its owner. Inside the outer shell was a smaller perfect egg with a hard shell. The egg is considered remarkable by experts of the county. The two eggs weighed 2½ ounces.

The outside shell, which had a circumference of 9½ inches lengthwise and 7½ inches in the middle, contained the white and yolk, and inside of this the other egg with a hard shell was found. The double egg is on exhibition in a local market.

THE MERCY STAKES.

London, July 24.—The Mercy Stakes of 700 sovereigns for 2-year-olds, distance five furlongs, was run at the Liverpool summer meeting today, and was won by H. W. Whitney's chestnut colt Harmonicon, by Disguise—Harp-chord. Sir E. Vincent's Diagenes was second, and Whitney's chestnut colt by Voter—Nonday took third. Nine horses ran.

FLOODS IN WISCONSIN.

Wausau, Wis., July 24.—Flood damage estimated at \$1,000,000 was wrought today from the breaking of two dams on the Wisconsin River, north of Wausau.

Three bridges in this city have been washed out, and a fourth has been partly destroyed. All electric power, including street car service, has been put out of commission.

WITNESSES FEAR DEATH FROM GANG

Change Testimony at Rosenthal Inquest When Menaced By Looks.

CHARGED WITH PERJURY

Waiter, Fearing Power of the Gunmen, Says They Did Not Meet.

New York, July 24.—The first outward evidence of the effect of gang terrorism on witnesses of the murder of Herman Rosenthal, gambler, was seen today. As a result, John Reissler, familiarly known as "John the Barber," is under arrest charged with perjury.

Reissler was called as a witness before Coroner Feinberg at the preliminary examination of Sam Paul and "Bridgey" Webber, who are alleged to have been leaders in the movement to silence Rosenthal when he threatened to expose the connection between the police and the gambler.

Before the hearing Reissler testified in the presence of District Attorney Whitman and Assistant Prosecutor Moss that he saw Webber running away from the Metropole just at the moment the crime was committed. In the coroner's office, however, when Reissler looked at Webber and the small army who had managed to get tickets admitting them to the hearing, he seemed stricken with terror, and immediately began to deny the damaging testimony he had previously given concerning the accused men.

He began by saying that he was in front of the Cadillac Hotel in East Forty-third street just at the time of the murder, and that he had seen "Bridgey" Webber, but he was not sure that Webber was running as he had previously told Mr. Whitman; he was not positive that he had even seen Webber.

"Did you not say that you were afraid to testify in this case and that you were afraid they would take your life?"

"No, I said I did not wish to get mixed up in it."

"John the Barber" was perspiring and frightened within an inch of his life.

Excited, Not Sure.
Assistant District Attorney Moss then testified to the story Reissler had told previously to the district attorney and himself, and Reissler was then questioned by H. T. Marshall, counsel for Webber. The witness seemed more terrified than ever and to each question replied:

"I think so, but in all the excitement I am not sure."

As he left the stand the district attorney ordered his arrest for perjury. The hearing of Webber was continued until Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and Paul's hearing went over for 48 hours. Admittance to the hearing was by card, through the fact that the gangster friends of the accused men might try to pack the room and make trouble. Strangely enough the very men who were supposed to be excluded managed to secure tickets, while lawyers and newspapermen who had legitimate business at the hearings were shut out. Two gangsters were arrested on leaving the hearing, carrying with carrying pistols.

Waiter Fears Gang.
The power of the fear of the big men of the Tenderloin was again shown when Herman Stern, waiter at the Lafayette bath, denied that Jack Ross, "Bridgey" Webber and Sam Paul breakfasted at the baths on the morning after the murder. Stern previously declared that he had waited on these men at this breakfast.

The police have declared that the crowd in the street at the time of the shooting was so great that the officers did not care to fire at the escaping murderers.

In view of his statement the district attorney is trying to find out who, with all the people on the street only one witness was furnished for the coroner's examination today. He repeats his claim that the police convinced at the Metropole restaurant of the gambler who was about to "squelch" on members of the department.

Missing Occupant Found.
Another sensational development was the discovery that one of the three missing occupants of the gray murder car, Harry Horowitz, known as "Gyp the Blood," had been seen at his old haunts in Harlem this afternoon. The police have sent descriptions of the man to many cities in the United States.

District Attorney Whitman today expressed the belief that the gray automobile into which the four men escaped after the shooting was a blind; that the men who had fled into it were not the murderers and that the real slayers escaped in the crowd which gathered on the street. Sherman and Miss Artie Hall, who were seated at a table near that occupied by Rosenthal on the night of the shooting, today declared that a man in a light suit ran into the Metropole restaurant after the first two shots were fired. This man has not yet been identified.

It was reported today that Charles E. Erbshtein, a noted criminal lawyer, has been retained to defend Rosenthal's slayers. Erbshtein was tried and acquitted about a year ago on a charge of jury fixing, and has been called "the Abe Hummel of Chicago."

Burns On the Case.
New York, July 25.—No apparent progress was made today in locating the men who are wanted for the actual killing of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, or in tracing the plot back to the policeman that the district attorney and Deputy Commissioner Dougherty believe had most at stake in the murder.

Rose himself tells for the first time of his relations with Rosenthal and his friends. He denies that he had any knowledge even that Rosenthal was to be killed, and he says that his activities in obtaining the affidavit from Dora Gilbert, who was his mistress, on account of his own account, was on Becker's. Rosenthal had attacked him as well as Becker in the affidavit, and he was just as sensitive about as persons on his character as Becker was.

Burns on the Job.
The W. J. Burns detective agency informed the district attorney that their men have gone to work on the case, and that they will hit on a resourcefulness and energy they possess will be directed toward getting at the truth. It was said that 23 Burns men have a ready-made detailed for the work, and that Mr. Burns himself, when he returns to New York in a day or two, will devote his entire time to the investigation.

HOLD A CONFERENCE ON FARMERS' BANK CASE

Toronto Police Magistrate Consults With Premier Over Latest Developments.

Toronto, July 25.—Gossip concerning the outcome of the Farmers' Bank inquiry was set going again yesterday afternoon, when Col. Geo. T. Denison called upon Sir James Whitney and spent half an hour in conversation. The evidence taken before Sir William Meredith has all been transcribed, the police magistrate has received his copy and is going over it carefully.

While it is known that the inquiry has been indefinitely adjourned, there will be no delay over the investigation by the Attorney-General's department. It is understood that everything is in readiness for Mr. Foy to take the matter up. He was absent attending Ward 4 Conservative picnic at Queenston Heights yesterday, but is expected at his office this morning.

Magistrate Denison, after leaving the Prime Minister's office, said he had come up to the Parliament Buildings to talk the matter over. "You must understand," said he, "that I can do nothing until the other commissioners, Mayor Geary and Judge Winchester, return to the city. I am the only member of the police board in town, and I cannot move alone." Subsequently it was learned that Col. Denison was really inquiring what course would be best to pursue and what instructions he should receive.

It is likely that before any summary action is taken, witnesses at the inquiry will be given an opportunity to place further testimony before the commission, although meanwhile those involved may come under the discipline of the police commissioners.

Sir James Whitney declined to make any comment on Col. Denison's visit. "He was here," said the Prime Minister, "but beyond that, I have nothing to say."

PERISHED IN ATTEMPT TO SHOOT RAPIDS

The Wheelman of Steamboat Collingwood Drowned at Sault Ste. Marie.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., July 25.—In an attempt to shoot the Sault rapids in a canoe last night, Alex. Scott, son of Skipper Scott, of the steamboat Collingwood, was drowned, and Alex. Webber, also of Collingwood, had a narrow escape. The first intimation of the accident received was when the canoe with Scott's coat was picked up below the rapids by a party coming from the Michigan Soo. Webber later made his way to the police station and gave details of the trip down. The body has not yet been recovered, but Captain Scott, of Collingwood, will remain in the Soo today and attempt to find it.

CROSSED CONTINENT TO TAKE REVENGE

Believed Montreal Foreigner Was Murdered as Result of Quarrel.

Montreal, July 24.—A grim chase by one Italian of another across the continent, the conclusion of which was a fatal shooting affray here on Monday night, was outlined in the evidence taken this morning at the inquest on Salvatore Marcuso. Witnesses stated that a man supposed to be Carlo Baptiste, followed Marcuso from Vancouver. One girl, the mistress of Marcuso, said Baptiste paid their fares to Vancouver last spring. When they got there he wanted them to help manage a disorderly house. They declined, and left Vancouver without informing Baptiste. It was the girl's belief that Baptiste had followed Marcuso and had shot and killed Marcuso to silence him. The assassin of Marcuso escaped.

A MONTREAL MYSTERY

Police Are Investigating the Death of Mrs. Boudrias.

Montreal, July 24.—The violent death of Mrs. Adelaide Boudrias is providing the police here with an interesting mystery. The body was found about two weeks ago in the river near Varennes. The coroner's jury which inquired into the case decided simply that the husband had been drowned. Her husband, however, after flinging her wedding ring into his face, and stating that she was going to poison herself.

Yesterday Theodore Moreau, brother of Mrs. Boudrias, hinted to the local police that she had met with foul play and asked for the reopening of the case. According to the information secured by the detectives put on the case the home life of the deceased was not a happy one, as she had so informed her relatives. That she was contemplating a departure from Montreal for her home in Milford, is shown by her appeal to her brother for the necessary funds. Her intention in this regard was known to her friends, and it is pointed out that her disappearance at the very moment when she was about to carry out her intention seems suspicious. Her body was found on Thursday, the day when she is alleged to have disappeared from view.

PASSENGERS INJURED.

Springfield, Missouri, July 24.—Many passengers were injured when an east-bound Kansas City-St. Louis passenger train on the St. Louis and San Francisco Railway was derailed near Lebanon, Mo., early today, according to reports received here. Railroad officials say no person was killed. A relief train was sent from Lebanon.

AMATEUR AIRMAN HURT.

Hempstead, July 24.—Edson F. Galaudt, a wealthy amateur aviator well known in New York and Washington, while flying on the aviation field at Hempstead Plain today, fell with his machine from a height of about 100 feet, and was seriously injured. Galaudt was flying in his original type monoplane, which is equipped with 100 horsepower.

MRS. LAWSON WEBS.

London, July 24.—Lord Hamilton of Dalzell and Mrs. William Lawson were quietly married in London today. Mrs. Lawson is the divorced wife of Lieut.-Col. William A. W. Lawson, D. S. O., second son of Lord Burnham, principal proprietor of the London Daily Telegraph, and the decree of divorce, which was granted on Jan. 15, was made absolute yesterday after the lapse of the legal six months.
