LOOKS LIKE FINE CROP

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 11.—Generally favorable and optimistic is the crop report of the Canadian Pacific Railway covering the week ending Friday.

With the exception of the last two days the weather for the week throughout the west has been just a little cool for the growing crop, but late reports on Friday showed that fine, ripening weather prevailed. There has been no damage from either cool or cloudy weather, as there was not enough to retard ripening. Cutting over the whole province of Manitoba will likely be general by the 15th.

There have been light hailstorms, but not enough to do any damage on the whole.

In Saskatchewan and Alberta cutting has started, and will be general by the 20th. Heads are well filled, straw is of medium length, and the prospect is very bright for the largest yield per acre in Saskatchewan of any of the provinces.

YOUNG HAMILTON GIRL DEAD THROUGH POISONED CANDIES

Four Others Ill and Husband of One Placed Under Arrest.

Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 11.—Miss Rose Zaibe, a young English girl, who resided at 97 East Burlington street, died tonight at the City Hospital, after eating candies given to her by Mrs. Edith Bruce, a patient at the hospital, whom she was visiting. Mrs. Bruce, her two sisters, Misses Gertrude and Ethel Dabry, 97 East Burlington street, and Miss Margaret Vance, 222 East Wood street, are all critically ill, supposedly as a result of poisonous matters in the candies, of which they also partook. A stomach pump was used on all of them, and they will likely recover. Miss Zaibe died before the pump could be used or emetics administered.

WHY ROSE SQUEALED

New York, Aug. 11.—The true story of what drove Jack Rose to the confession that put Lieutenant Becker in the Tombs charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, is told here for the first time. It was the reply, whispered to him in the council room of the Tombs, to the third message he had sent to a police official asking whether he could rely on Becker's promises of protection.

This was the answer to his final appeal: "The best thing for you to do is to kill yourself." That advice, sent to Rose one week after he had surrendered himself, was a plain intimation that he was being shifted for himself. So Rose, who had been hoping against hope, agreed to the persuasion of his lawyer, James E. Sullivan, and sent Sullivan to District Attorney Whitman.

UNIONIST LEADER ANOTHER TILLET CHURCHILL LASHES BONAR LAW

Opposition Leader in British Commons, and Carson Came In for Scathing Criticism by First Admiralty Lord for Inciting Orangemen to Civil War.

London, Aug. 11.—Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, has been so busy with the administration of naval affairs since he took his new office that he has abstained from party politics. He now takes advantage of a parliamentary recess to trounce Bonar Law and Sir Edward Carson in a public letter.

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FRANCE LIKELY TO SUPPORT BRITAIN'S PANAMA PROTEST

Paris Press Says the Americans Have Violated Legal Engagements.

Paris, Aug. 11.—Quoting approvingly British protests against the action of the American Senate in passing the Panama Canal bill, which, among other things, provides for the remission of tolls to American vessels engaged in coastwise and foreign traffic, the Paris Temps, in an article published today, foresees a tariff war of all the powers against the United States, unless President Taft vetoes a course which wrongs the interests of the rest of the world, and belies the solemn assurances given at Washington, that the whole purpose of the work at Panama was in the interest of mankind in general.

The Temps, which says that it does not wish to intervene in a controversy which the American Government has definitely decided the course it will take, concludes: "Perhaps the Americans better would serve their commercial interests by more scrupulously respecting their legal engagements. Fidelity to a pledged word is often sagacious."

The French newspapers anticipate that France will back up the British protest. At the foreign office, however, it was said today that no decision had yet been taken.

FATHER SEEKS CHILDREN SCATTERED FOR MANY YEARS

Family of Samuel Shaw Was Separated When the Mother Died—One of the Sons Is Believed to Have Been Killed.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, Aug. 12.—Twenty-five years ago Samuel H. Shaw, his wife and four little children resided in Port Huron. Today the father is in Huron. The mother and wife have been dead many long years, and the children have each gone their separate ways into the big world.

It is the same old sad story: when the wife died the grief-stricken father went sailing, the youngsters at home were adopted by relatives, and as time passed by each lost track of the others, as people sometimes will. And now the lonely old father longs to see his children again. They are children no longer, and it is to the Huron police his search that the Port Huron police are investigating at the request of the secretary of the welfare committee in Cleveland. Margaret, Jane, John and Henry are the missing ones.

It was learned that the last named was brought up and educated by a relative in Sarnia, a Mrs. John Elliott, although it is not known whether the woman still resides here or not. Henry, whose whereabouts are unknown, is believed that John was a Grand Trunk engineer, killed in an accident some time ago.

The local police are co-operating with the American authorities in their investigation, and it is expected that before long they will discover some clue which will bring father and children together again.

MISSING SAILORS SAW THE WHITE LIGHTS

Trio for Whom Police Were Searching Were Located in Port Huron.

NEW OILING SYSTEM FOR USE IN TUNNEL

Flange Wear on Electric Locomotives Overcome by

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, Aug. 12.—One of the serious difficulties encountered by the St. Clair Tunnel Company, operating between here and Port Huron, has been excessive flange wear on the wheels of the electric locomotives used. This trouble was due doubtless to the facts that no leading or trail trucks are used and that the locomotives must pass through numerous sharp curves in the yards at each end of the tunnel.

To eliminate wear of this kind an ingenious flange oiling system has been invented by Mr. W. D. Hall, superintendent of Grand Trunk Power Plant and Electrical Equipment by

means of which it is now possible to make over 50,000 miles between turnings. Previously when the locomotives which are required to handle 1,000 ton trains on the 2 per cent grades of the tunnel were on the down grade, the application of the brakes made the tires so hot that grease could not be used.

The apparatus designed by Mr. Hall sprays oil into the flanges when they are lubricating. This is accomplished by the pressure of an electric button or the pressure of an air valve. The tire is sprayed with oil and this both lubricates the flanges and cleans them from any dirt as well. For electric locomotives a single button in any car operates the valve that supplies oil and air.

For steam locomotives a small air valve of the push button type located in a convenient position operates the valve of the foreign substances and is thinned by the addition of a little coal oil in cold weather.

HORSE CARS AGAIN PRESSED INTO SERVICE

Temporary Electric Plant Broke Down as Result of Being Overloaded.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, Aug. 12.—Sarnia is once more without an electric street car service as a result of the temporary plant, secured from the D. U. R., having broken down as a result of being overloaded.

It will be two weeks, anyway, before the necessary repairs can be completed, and in the meantime, "busses, boats and vehicles of all sorts are being pressed into service.

Coming, as it does, during the summer tourist season, the breakdown is most inconvenient. Several times recently, it is stated, there have been many warnings that the machinery was being overloaded.

INQUEST OPENS IN THE PARKS DEATH

Child Is Alleged to Have Died From Starvation and Neglect.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, Aug. 12.—The remains of the little Parks girl, who was found a mile from Sarnia, while the funeral was being held, was brought to Sarnia by Constable Lucas, and the jury under Coroner Dr. Lorkie viewed the remains and then adjourned until Wednesday afternoon.

It is alleged that the child died from starvation and neglect. Mrs. Merrick and McDonald are making a post-mortem.

HELD BY POLICE

Suspicious Character Was Taken By Immigration Officers.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, Aug. 11.—Inspector Pettit, of the American immigration office at Saint Clair, brought a suspicious-looking character to Port Huron today. The man attempted to enter the States by way of the port, coming across the river from Courtwright by ferry. It is not known just what charge he is held on, but the mere fact that he was not instantly deported is evidence that he is held for some cause or other.

ACCUSED BY GRENFELL OF A MISAPPROPRIATION.

Head of the Seamen's Institute at St. John's Is Placed Under Arrest.

Halifax, Aug. 11.—C. H. Karnopp, superintendent of the Grenfell Seamen's Institute, has been arrested at St. John's, Newfoundland, as a depositor made by Dr. Grenfell, charging him with misappropriation of the institute's funds to the amount of \$1,000. The action was taken by Dr. Grenfell after receiving the report of the charitable auditors, who annually audit the accounts of the mission.

After the shortage was made known Dr. Grenfell communicated with the justice department and the arrest of Karnopp followed. Karnopp was released from custody, pledging himself in \$5,000, and with security of Dr. MacPherson and A. Templeton in \$1,000.

SULTAN ABDICATES; WILL GO TO FRANCE

Moroccan Monarch Has Had Enough of Strenuous Ruling at Rabat.

[Canadian Press.] Rabat, Morocco, Aug. 12.—The abdication of Mulai Hafid, the sultan of Morocco, is practically an accomplished fact. He probably will leave Rabat bound for France immediately.

The sultan has expressed the desire that one of his brothers succeed to the sultanate, and Mulai Yussouf, the present khedive of Fez, who is friendly to France, doubtless will be appointed.

Negotiations between Mulai Hafid and Gen. Lyautey, the French resident governor, to this end, have been arranged.

The sultan must publicly announce his decision to abandon power for reasons of health before he leaves the country, so as to avoid the danger of an appeal to fanaticism on the ground that he had been coerced. Until such proclamation is issued Mulai Hafid's abdication will not be accepted.

PRIESTS SUBMIT TO ARCHBISHOP

Rebellious Brothers of Monro College Obey Order From the Vatican.

BRUCHESI IS UPHELD

Inurgent Clergymen Too Be Scattered? Interdiction of Orders, and Severely Punished for Attitude.

Montreal, Aug. 11.—Events moved rapidly today in the struggle between the priests of the Ste. Marie Monro College at St. Johns and the ecclesiastical authorities who interdicted them for refusing to remove their institution from that town and return to the Diocese of Ste. Hyacinthe, where they were located under Bishop Bernard's jurisdiction some years ago, before a disastrous fire destroyed their buildings and caused them to decide in favor of removing to some more favorable site.

Today a letter from the Sacred Consistorial congregation at Rome, a court of last resort, was read in all the churches throughout the dioceses of Montreal and Ste. Hyacinthe, preceded by a brief joint episcopal note from Archbishop Bruchesi and Bishop Bernard, fully supporting the interdiction rulings of the two prelates, rulings which were supported by the apostolic delegate at Ottawa, and condemning in the most severe terms the priests who have opposed their ecclesiastical superiors.

Following this, an authoritative announcement was given out that the priests had decided to submit to the ruling of the Holy See; that the Mr. Edwards whose claims against the college had resulted in the civil court order declaring that the priests must not leave St. Johns until these claims had been fully settled, had agreed to accept \$50,000, permitting the priests to go where they chose, and that the priests, following their submission, would be rehabilitated and their suspension lifted.

The college will be abandoned and the priests scattered among other dioceses in other capacities. This will leave the field at St. Johns open for Archbishop Bruchesi's educational institution.

The letter from the Consistorial College refers to the petition of the priests, dated July 11, against the decrees of Archbishop Bruchesi, Bishop Bernard, and the Apostolic delegate, and declares absolutely against the pretensions of the priests. The decision was unanimous, and it was afterwards confirmed by His Holiness the Pope.

The letter (translated from the Latin text) continues, in part, as follows, referring in particular to the necessity of their abandoning their college:

"As such a prolonged and stubborn resistance on the part of these priests to the orders of their bishops, to the sentences duly and legitimately accorded, and even to the notices and commands of the Holy See, is a thing absolutely condemnable, and as the other hand they have resorted to futile pretenses, which they themselves could have avoided, in order to refuse obedience, it follows, therefore, that these priests must be considered in absolute rebellion against the legitimate authority of the church, and as such absolutely unworthy of having the education of children committed to their care by the faithful of the church."

Question of Discipline. "How could these men authoritatively form the minds of children in notions of discipline, respect towards their legitimate superiors, and submission and respect to their parents, as well as in all Christian virtues; they who for so long a time and in so public a manner, have given such a sad example of lack of discipline and obedience; they who have been condemned by the supreme authority of the church, and have been removed from its sacred functions?" And only after a suitable penance for the very grave scandal caused to the faithful, and after manifesting signs of repentance for their sins, shall they be rehabilitated in the exercise of their holy ministry.

The bishops are also told to warn the priests that if they persist in their attitude they will incur even greater punishment.
