

MAGISTRATE SCORES DEFENCE WITNESSES

Serious Moral Depravity Revealed by Evidence in Court.

WINDSOR, Oct. 19.—Magistrate Gandy severely scored five witnesses for the defence at the close of the hearing of the charge laid against Steven Lesterance, aged 49, garage owner of committing a serious statutory offence against a fourteen-year-old girl.

The hearing of evidence in the matter began at 2 p.m. and lasted till 11:30 p.m. During cross-examination each of the five witnesses called by the defence admitted that he had been guilty of similar offenses, while the evidence of one witness, Louis Gillman, 42, a farmer of West Sandwich, was of such a nature as to cause the magistrate to declare, "it is the worst story of moral depravity that I have ever heard. Conditions revealed by the evidence is almost past belief."

Lesterance, who is a married man, was remanded till Saturday for sentence. The court refused to grant a renewal of the \$10,000 bail.

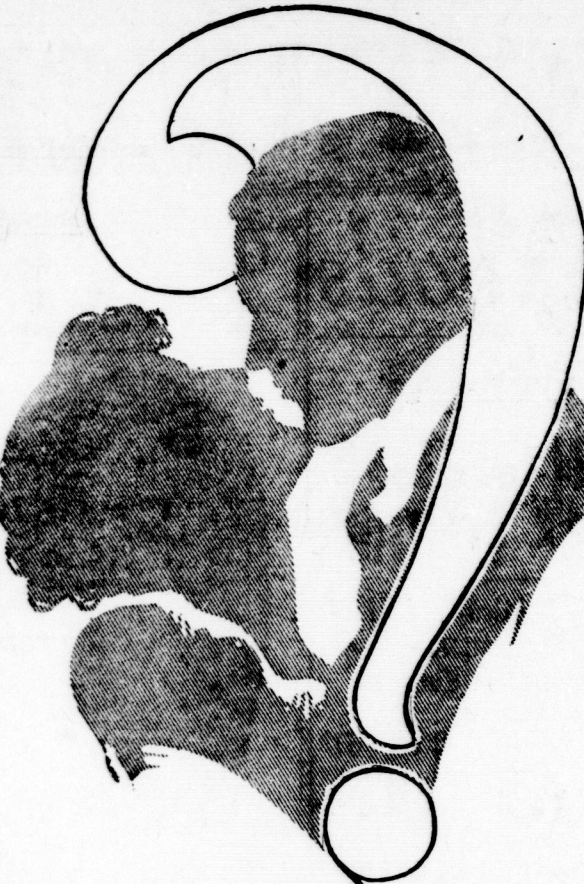

Marie Lohr Triumphant In Fedora, Master Tragedy

"Fedora," as played by Marie Lohr at the Grand Theatre last evening, is a master tragedy. Running the gamut of human passions, the plot winds up and unrolls again in the simplest manner possible, but yet with deadly precision, as consequence follows quick upon the heels of consequence, precipitating a climax in the third act, when Fedora commands the love of the man she has been seeking to destroy, and bringing about the final tragic denouement which cannot be satisfied without Fedora's death by her own hand.

Written by Victorien Sardou expressly to display Sara Bernhardt's dramatic art, "Fedora" has been attempted by few actresses. And this alone makes Marie Lohr's success in the role the more amazing.

A sweet face and quiet dignity, which are hers, carry behind them a personality capable of expressing the passions, the love, hate and jealousy of a primitive soul. She is truly a great artist, and the flowers, which were thrown upon the stage last night, were but a silent tribute to her genius.

Playing the role of a Russian princess, who becomes enamored of her fiancé, and the drama concludes with a death scene—her own suicide, which comes as a direct result of her determination to avenge the death of her fiancé.

MAYOR M. G. DEAN ACCEPTS NOMINATION IN S. OXFORD

Liberals Convinced He Will Redem Riding From Tories

TILLSONBURG, Oct. 19.—Mayor M. G. Dean today announced his decision to stand as the Liberal standard-bearer in South Oxford, and the news comes as a boom to the Conservative party who for days past have actually counted Mayor Dean out of the field.

Mr. Dean, who, although only 37 years of age, has an enviable municipal record, having served the town as mayor twice, a councillor two years, hydro commissioner, and on several other public utilities. This is the first time that a local man for the citizens to vote for a local man for the town will pile up a huge majority for him regardless of party politics.

The candidate has always been a strong advocate of temperance, and it was mainly through the support promised from the temperance workers in South Oxford that Mayor Dean decided to enter the field. He is the proprietor of the local Ford garage, and a widely-known auctioneer.

The citizens of Ingersoll have promised some surprising support, and with an excellent Liberal organization in the riding there is no doubt but that Mayor Dean is the real contender in the race, and that South Oxford will again be redeemed to the Liberal party.

WILL USE CITY VOTERS' LIST FOR THE ELECTION

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 19.—To expedite the compilation of the voters' lists for the coming election the chief election officer, with the consent of all parties concerned, has directed that the municipal lists be used as a basis where the provincial lists are not available. It has been found that in some urban districts it would have been impossible to register the voters within the time limit set by the act. The cities are divided into districts of 4,000, or as near that as conditions will permit. But the registrars have discovered that if the procedure directed by the act be strictly followed there would be an incomplete registration in some of the divisions.

WELLINGTON HAY TO BE LEADER PRO TEM

Chosen by Ontario Liberals To Temporarily Succeed Dewart.

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—Wellington Hay, member for the North Perth constituency and Liberal whip, was appointed leader pro tem. of the Liberal forces in Ontario following the resignation of H. Hartley Dewart, K.C., today owing to ill-health.

The Liberal members of the Legislature met in caucus this afternoon and the resignation of Mr. Dewart was laid before them. The caucus expressed appreciation of the sacrifices of Mr. Dewart for the party and a committee was appointed to arrange for a suitable recognition thereof.

J. W. Curry, K.C., who left the Liberal "wing" last season, attended the caucus and, it is understood, will return to the fold now that Mr. Dewart has withdrawn from the leadership.

In his letter of resignation Mr. Dewart said in part:

"I must confess that I keenly felt the open attacks and the more veiled, but equally appreciable, disloyalty of others."

"I have almost impoverished myself to try and save the good name of the party and yet I am daily harassed by financial demands that were not of my making."

"I am not merely referring to members of the House, but to the utter lack of appreciation of their duty by the rank and file of the Liberal party generally."

"It has been constantly urged upon me that I should give the agrarian outfit a chance. Heaven knows I went the limit. Despite all outside criticism and help, the financial condition of the province is in a sad way, which is not due to hydro obligations, but to gross mismanagement, absolute incompetency and extravagance or worse."

"Now the same outfit wants to try their 'prentice hand on the Dominion. God forbid."

"There should be no alliance or understanding, expressed or implied, between Liberalism and Cretinism. Perhaps it is better that I should drop out until we resume the consideration of provincial issues and leave those to 'soft pedal' who will, reserving my own attitude of independence."

DETROITER COVERS 229 MILES IN 4 HOURS

Recent Claim of Wabash Roaders Brings Quick Reply.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 19.—The Wabash fast train, recently reported to have covered the distance, 229 miles, between Windsor and Bridgeburg, in five hours and fifteen minutes, a claim which has created much discussion in local railway circles, apparently has a serious rival in the celebrated M. C. R. flyer, "The Detroitier."

M. C. R. officials declare that "The Detroitier" is doing the distance every day in four hours and nine minutes and not saying a word about it. They also assert that sometimes when "The Detroitier" is behind time she does it in less than four hours. This remarkable traveling may be verified, they point out, at any time by application to Chief Dispatcher George Gott.

Domestic Quarrel.
Alleged to have failed to carry out his part of the agreement with his wife from whom he is separated, Harold Buxton, taxi driver, was before Magistrate Maxwell this morning. An arrangement had been made some months ago that Buxton would pay his wife \$10 weekly. Mr. Buxton's counsel brought out of court that the agreement was not carried out.

Alleged Bailly Horse.
A horse sold on the 48-hour guarantee, but, notwithstanding the assurance given of its soundness, it has been found faulty, was the cause of an action brought by H. B. Power against Charles Branson, Jr., Payne's Mills, to recover the sum of a note given in part payment for the animal. There was much contradictory swearing. Mr. Branson claimed that the horse was bailly. Mr. Flood, a London teamster who owned the horse at one time, thought the contrariness of the animal was due to a faulty collar. Judgment was reserved.

Diphtheria.
The interment of Gladys Sikora, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Sikora, who died yesterday from an attack of diphtheria, took place this afternoon in the Catholic Cemetery.

MORAVIANTOWN, Oct. 19.—A meeting was held a few nights ago to appoint delegates to the Farmers' or Progressive convention to be held in Chatham. Three were appointed, but several refused to go, because they could not agree to the Farmers' platform. Some were Conservative, and others Liberal. Moraviantown will be as lively on politics as elsewhere.

Liberal Women Laugh At Tory Blue Ruin Cry

BRANTFORD, Oct. 19.—In spite of a heavy downpour of rain a very large number of ladies, thoroughly representative of the community, attended the meeting at the Liberal headquarters today for the purpose of organizing for the coming election.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Frank Leeming, and addresses were delivered by Mrs. John Hodge, Mrs. Harry Carpenter of Hamilton, president of the Ontario Women's Liberal Association, and the candidate, W. G. Raymond.

Mrs. Hodge satirically reviewed some of the blue ruin prophecies that were made of the evils that would befall Brantford if the Government candidate was not returned; the grass growing in the streets, etc., etc., as prophesied by W. F. Cockshutt; and said that a review of the city would show conclusively that its best and soundest growth was between 1896 and 1911 when the Liberal Administration was in power at Ottawa. She spoke of the candidature of Mr. W. G. Raymond, saying that in him the women of Brantford had a candidate of whom they need not be ashamed.

Mrs. Harry Carpenter opened with some very complimentary references to the candidate, whom she had known for some time, saying that the large number of ladies present under such extremely unfavorable circumstances was certainly a very strong tribute to his standing with the women of the constituency. She continued by referring to the fact that this election would be the first time that all women had a vote and that they should appreciate the value of it; that they should study politics and understand what was best for the country and above all keep politics clean. She made a very eloquent and effective address.

Officers of the club and chairmen for the various wards and districts were elected.

The meeting demonstrated the earnestness of the women of Brantford in behalf of Mr. W. G. Raymond, the Liberal candidate, and augured well for his success on election day.
