ROUT REBELS IN COUNTY MAYO

Free State Troops Clear Large Areas in West of Ireland.

De Valera Reported Suffering From Strain of Recent Events.

Dublin, July 25.—Additional large areas in the west of Ireland have been cleared by the free state forces, before whom the irregulars are retreating precipitantly, according to today's official report. Claremorris, County Mayo, is the latest town to be freed of the rebels who have now retired to Ballinrobe on the border between Galway and Mayo.

The liberated inhabitants of Claremorris, overjoyed at the entry of the free state troops, continued their rejoicing through the night, according to the report.

A message from Thurles, Tipperary, filed late yesterday, said an attack by the irregulars was expected there last night, as they had declared their intention of taking the town, which hitherto has been held by the national forces.

Eamon De Valera, accompanied by the insurgents last Sunday to Tipperary, but, according to reports, left for Cashel, twelve miles distant, the next day. The strain of recent events is said to have left him pale and weak.

The irregulars are said to have burned the military barracks at Cashel and Tipperary.

Intense fighting is in progress in the vicinity of Kilmallock, County Limerick, according to reports reaching Dublin today. The reports stated that the Republican irregulars were trying to delay the advance of the national army troops, but while a good many men are said to be engaged in the fighting, nothing like a pitched battle is apparently possible.

The communications of the national forces are reported to be suffering here and there from small but active bands of guerrilla fighters, who, by wearing civilian clothes, are finding it easy to escape after cutting field telegraph lines and otherwise harassing the national troops.

The latter, however, are reported to be continuing their advance.

Captain Holmes is a nephew of Col. Holmes, former commanding officer of this district, and is well-known in the city.

He is traveling secretary of the Officers' Christian Union of London, England, and is associated with Col. Foster in O. C. U. work. Col. Fisher addressed the Canadian Club here last fall.

FEAR PAVEMENT IN COUNTY HELD UP

Westminster Officials Hold Little Hope for Continuation of Highway.

There is but slight hope now extended in county circles for a continuation of the new paved highway from Talbotville to Lambeth Village, as desired by Westminster Township.

John Stuart, clerk for Middlesex County, explained to The Advertiser Tuesday morning, that the indications pointed to nothing further developing this year, despite the fact that representative citizens of both the county and the city of London had evinced great interest in the proposal and secured of one accord that the road should be finished.

Mr. Stuart explained that while it was agreed at the last meeting of the Westminster council that John Cousins, warden, should personally appeal to the Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of highways, upon the matter, that the appeal had been delayed. In the meanwhile it has been learned that the roadway unit completed from St. Thomas to Talbotville will be extended another three miles north of the latter community. It is the desire of the Westminster officials that the same be continued to Lambeth, thus completing a paved highway from St. Thomas to London.

RESTORE PENSION OF WAR VETERAN

Ottawa, July 25.—If an ex-soldier in receipt of a permanent pension for a wound in the ankle subsequently loses the leg through an accident in civilian life, have the pension authorities just grounds for cutting off the pension?

This puzzling problem was presented to the Dominion command, Great War Veterans' Association, some time ago, in the case of ex-Pte. John Munro, of Lake View Ranch, Minnola, B. C., and has recently been settled by the restoration of the pension which had been discontinued following the accident in which Munro lost his leg. There is probably not another case of parallel circumstances in the records of the Canadian pensions.

The case was reopened and after further consideration pension was restored to Munro and back payment made to the time of discontinuance.

Health Officer Thinks Logan Township Indigent Has Become "Hospitalized"

Operation of the new bylaw which requires that all city indigent patients be examined by Dr. W. S. Downham prior to admission to Victoria Hospital is no easy task, according to the medical officer of health, whose duties have been increased by the bylaw.

However, Dr. Downham admits that the bylaw has already been the means of saving the city money which would be required to pay for maintenance of out-of-town patients who, under former conditions, would likely have been admitted to hospital as civil charges.

SPRINGBANK CONSTABLE KNOWS OF NO RUM-SELLERS

Edward Dawson Declares Behavior of Park Visitors Tame.

"If anyone has any charge to make, let them come out in the open." Such was the declaration Tuesday by Edward Dawson, constable at the city's park at Springbank, replying to the charge that promiscuous "boot-legging" is in progress in that locality.

Constable Dawson states that during his three years in his present capacity he has experienced but little trouble on the grounds, more particularly during the past few weeks. There is no park throughout Canada, he contends, where the conduct and general behavior of the visitors is so good.

"If there are any bootleggers operating," said Constable Dawson, "then I don't know where they are, although I am not saying that there are none. If these persons know who they are, why do they not have them arrested?"

He intimated, in conclusion, that he would welcome an investigation.

APPEAL FOR STATE AID AGAINST MOONSHINERS

Residents of Kingsdale, Near Duluth, Terrorized by Actions of Liquor Men.

Minneapolis, July 25.—Terrorized, they said, by moonshiners over-running the district, citizens of Kingsdale, 40 miles south of Duluth, today appealed to state and federal authorities for aid, declaring their village has become the center of organized liquor dealings extending throughout Minnesota.

The village has been terrorized by moonshiners since last fall, and citizens reported to Governor Preus a raid of last winter, when twelve armed men rode through one street shooting out windows and firing at people in the streets. They never were captured. Later, he said, there were wild dances and liquor orgies, with fights constantly occurring.

Before the moonshiners dynamited the Grace Hotel last week, they man-handled the railroad station agent and bound him, so that he could not send out any word of the dynamiting. The town has no telephone.

RASPBERRIES DROP ON CITY MARKET

Corn Sells On Local Square at 30c to 35c Dozen.

Raspberries took an unexpected drop on the local market on Tuesday morning and were plentiful at 15c per box. A few dealers were asking 20c, but the majority were sold at the lower figure. The quality of fruit offered for sale was very good, considering that the season is drawing to a close. The demand was strong.

Black raspberries are not as plentiful as the red, but sold at the same price. The dealers are becoming scarce each day, and the end of the week will see the last of the crop. The price advanced and there were no fair demand at \$1.25 per 11-quart baskets.

Apples are more plentiful, but on the local market on Tuesday morning, a few dealers were asking \$1.25 per 150 per bushel. Gooseberries were much in evidence and sold well at \$1 for the 11-quart baskets and 60c for the 6-quart size. The vegetable crop this year is exceptionally good, and every variety was offered in large quantities. The prices of most lines are firm.

Potatoes were plentiful at \$1 a bushel, a drop of 2c from Saturday's price. Tomatoes are becoming more plentiful every day, and registered a substantial drop, selling at \$1.50 per 11-quart basket. There was more corn on the market Tuesday morning than previously. It sold at 30c to 35c per dozen.

Beans were plentiful and of good quality at 25c per bushel. Cucumbers dropped from the previous price of \$1 to 40c per dozen. Onions, beets, carrots, and radishes remained steady at 35c to 40c per dozen. A shipment of live hogs on Wednesday will bring \$13 per cwt, a decrease of \$1.

Current rural holders had largely stopped selling, and it was pointed out that the amount of wheat about for export showed a falling off as compared with a week ago. Commission houses and shorts were the chief buyers for Europe, showing a fall in unchanged figures to 1c higher, was followed by moderate gains all around.
