

# Owen Sound Greys Romp Away From Kitchener Kids in First Final

## GREEN SHIRT JUNIORS DEFEATED BY GREYS

Kitchener Loses Initial O. H. A. Junior Final by 7-2 Score.

TEAM WORK IS FACTOR  
Owen Sound Outshines Losers in Every Department of Game.

Owen Sound Greys defeated Kitchener youngsters, 7 to 2, in the first of the O. H. A. Junior finals here last night, in a game which turned out to be little more than a workout for the much-touted northerners. Owen Sound had everything, just as the advance notices more than broadly hinted. The period counts, 2-1, 1-1 and 7-2, did not begin to show the superiority of the Greys in every department, and at times it looked as if they could have gone out and got more goals, if somebody had set them off.

Only for a small portion of the third period, after Kitchener had scored its second, did the Greys lose dominance in the play, and hereabouts, for a space of five minutes, the young Green Shirts gave a good account of themselves, using their weight to good advantage and sallying down individually to pepper shots at Smith. It was at this juncture that Smith showed he was the final cog in what the fans freely acknowledged is one of the greatest little hockey machines they have ever seen perform. From goal out there isn't a weak spot in the team, and the subs are that because they insist on six-man hockey.

Defence Almost Perfect.  
Greys have almost a perfect defence in Cain and Graham, a cool, collected pair who make the least possible number of moves, but always the right ones, and the Kitchener kids had little luck in penetrating through to a scoring position. They are a good pair of rushes, Cain especially breaking fast. The forward line works like a machine. On their offensive forays they went down abreast, and worked a fast pace right in on top of the Kitchener defence and net.

Welland, Keeling and Elliott are a wonderful scoring machine, and in their few spare moments are a front-line defence, adept at hooking perfectly good-looking, comely players to a dull stop, or using their extraordinary speed to get back and form a six-man defence. Kitchener youngsters broke slowly, and in times hunched under, and their attempts at team-play looked rough and crude compared to the purring way the Sounders worked in for goals.

Ziegler in the early part of the game and Groh toward the end looked the best for the Green Shirts, but it wasn't in the players that Kitchener lacked balance, so much as in their team work and style of play. They pulled off flashes of brilliant hockey, but it wasn't as premeditated as the style dished up by the northern youngsters.

Lack Checking Ability.  
Klein in goal was picked as a weak spot by some of the experts, but in the second and third periods he made some spectacular stops as the Grey attackers stepped right in on his crease. Kitchener lacked the checking ability of its conquerors, the strong-armed, well conditioned, fast-moving Greys shoving aside checks and still keeping the puck for their close-up work on goal.

The Sounders are shooting fools. Every one of the seven men packs a wicked shot, especially Keeling and Elliott. Keeling's drives came from a sharp angle and right across where Klein wears his vest buttons.

"Some of the more partisan supporters of the Ottawas will probably blame the referees for the loss of the game," states the Citizen. "But that would be unfair to the new champions. There are others who will attribute the downfall to one of the greatest teams that ever stepped out on ice, to inferior net guarding on the part of Benedict, and weak play on the part of Captain Nigh, but these alibis are not sufficient. True, Benedict had an off night and Nigh, after being clipped over the eye by Billy Boucher early in the first period, appeared to lose his effectiveness but the fact remains, Canadiens turned in a very superior brand of championship hockey and are entitled to the spoils of victory."

Report of Annual Meeting Shows Club House Practically Paid For.

The executive committee consisted of: J. A. Taylor, H. A. Stonehouse, H. Martin were re-elected, and the names of Dr. S. A. Richardson and William McNairne added to the list.

J. A. Taylor was elected manager of the intermediate lacrosse team and James McKenna, manager of the juniors. The executive was given power to send two or more delegates to the O. A. L. A. convention in Toronto Good Friday.
