Y.W.C.A. PHYSICAL EXHIBITION
WILL BE FINER THAN EVER

Miss Edith Wynne-Pryce Prepares Attractive Program For Early May.

TECHNIQUE A FEATURE

Beautiful "Blue Danube Waltz" Will Bring the Evening to a Close.

This year the annual Y. W. C. A. exhibition of physical work, to be presented some time during the first week of May, promises to be even finer than ever. Miss Edith Wynne-Pryce, secretary of physical education at the Y. W. C. A. and director of the exhibition, has been working energetically for some weeks past getting her classes in shape for the program which will surpass anything of its kind ever given in the city. It will include drills and aesthetic dances, illustrative of how the right kind of physical exercise induces health, grace and poise. All of the classes will take part, from the senior girls, who are working enthusiastically on their costumes, to the little tots who are watching every step to see that it is just right for the big event.

This will be the third annual exhibition put on by the Y. W. C. A. under the direction of Miss Pryce. Last year so large was the audience which turned out to see it that hundreds were sent away from the armories. The committee is trying to arrange for better accommodation this year. Perhaps the loveliest number of the whole program this year will be "The Blue Danube Waltz," which will bring the evening to a close. In this number about thirty young girls in floating draperies of pale pink and blue, and other shades will execute the intricate movements of the dance with the help of filmy scarfs, trays of roses and tambourines.

Technique and Plasticity. Another exceedingly pretty and interesting part of the program will be that devoted to technique and plasticity of dancing, illustrative of rhythm and grace, by means of the fundamental steps of dancing are taught. The members of the dancing classes, all in simple pale gray costumes, made Grecian fashion, will take part.

Following this will be presented "The Song of the Robin," a charming dance by the very little tots in filmy yellow costumes. Then the girls of the junior dancing class, in simple flowing costumes fashioned in all the lovely pastel shades, will dance "wood nymphs." This will be followed by "Autumn's beautiful dance," number to be given by the senior class. In this dance the colors of the costumes range through all autumn tones, from palest yellow, through the russet tones to a bright red.

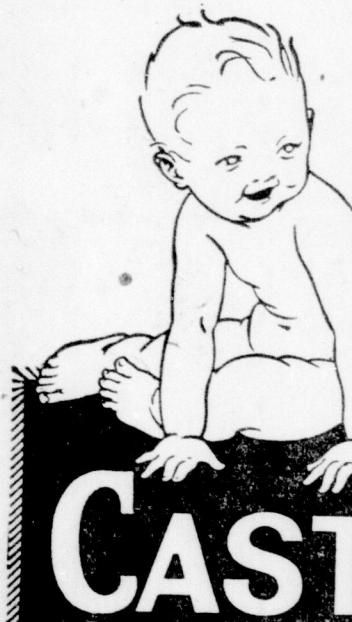
The senior class will also be seen in a quaint Spanish dance, "The Rose of Old Madrid," the costumes orange and black.

"Playtime." The junior dancing class will present "Playtime," a duet dance in which the girls will appear in picturesque Victorian dress with high bodices, socks and blue slippers, and the boys in short rose-colored trousers, white blouses and rose ties. The Blue Danube Waltz follows, bringing the second half of the program to a close.

The first part of the program opens with a grand march in which all of the classes will take part. The girls appearing in gym middie and bloomers, Dumbell exercises by the junior girls, and wand exercises and club swinging by the senior girls will follow immediately. Gymnastic exercises by massed classes will also be a feature of this half of the program, which will include a dance by the little tots, "Little Gossips," in quaint summer dresses and sunbonnets; a Dutch dance, "Tulip Time," by the junior girls, all attired in Holland blue; a Russian dance, "Ojra," in costume by the teen age girls and marching tactics by the seniors.

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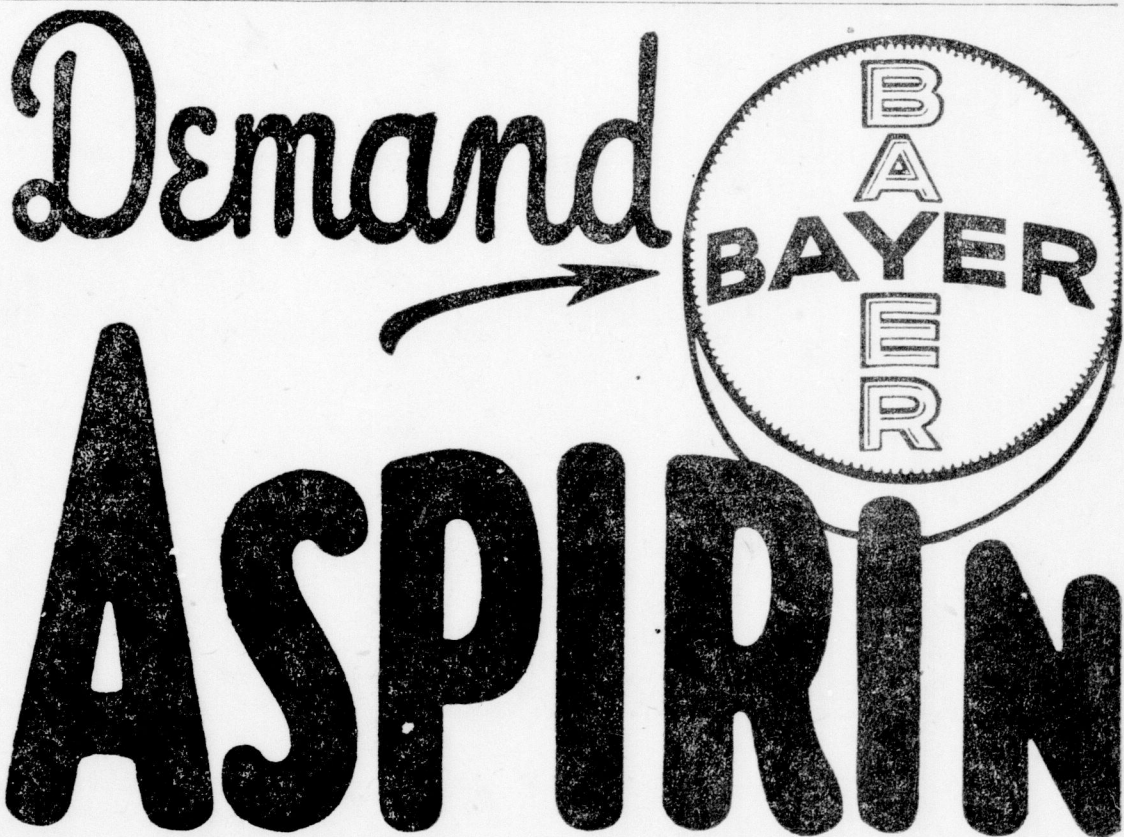
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
