Galt, Ont., May 15.—The organiza-
tion of the intercounty intermediate
series was completed here last night.
There are only three teams—Guelph
Spring and Axle, Brantford Alerts
and Galt Rangers. They decided to
play a double schedule, which was
drafted tonight and which opens on
May 25 and closes on August 1. The
first two teams will meet in a home-
and-home series for the league hon-
ors. W. H. Hese of Preston, vice-
president of the intercounty, who is
in charge of the series, presided at
tonight's meeting, which left the ap-
pointment of umpires with him, and
he announced he would use Kross of
Galt, Cockman of Guelph, Treusch
of Waterloo and Meyers of Preston.

The intercounty will also operate
a junior series, but in a playoff
form. The winners of the Galt and
Guelph city leagues and the Brant-
ford Cordage Kids will meet in an
elimination series to decide who wins
the intercounty honors and goes into
the O.B.A.A. playoff.
