#### ODES OF THREE TO ONE

Did Not Avail Russians Who Wers Beaten Off By Japs.

a Hundred Japs Were Killed-Gen

London, June 6.—The Daily Tele-graph's Tientsin correspondent wires:
"Four thousand Russians belonging to Gen. Stakelberg's brigade on May 31 attacked 1,500 Japanese occupying a position 15 miles south of Wafagtien. The Russians were repulsed, losing 200 killed and 400 wounded, The Japanese lost more than 100 killed."

Paris, June 6.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of The Matin says: "According to information received here Gen. Kuroki has been suffering from a mild attack of typhus fever, but he has now recovered.

"The general belief is that Gen. Kuropatkin will not advance to the relief of Port Arthur. In any case orders to do so have not yet been transmitted,

"I learn that England has obtained from Japan on behalf of Russia assurances that the Japanese will not destroy seals in Behring Sea during the war.

"It is rumored the army corps of the St. Petersburg district will be mobilized shortly. I have reason to believe that two other army corps in the central district will also be mobilized."

Peace Not Far Off.

London, June 6.—Japan's unbroken and overwhelming success is producing some curious effects on European opinion. Continental sympathies have been largely pro-Russian and were coupled until a week ago with the conviction that the war would soon demonstrate the military superiority of Russian arms.

The completeness of the Russian disaster at Nanshan seems to have created the impression that peace is not far off. Europe has apparently suddenly jumped to the conclusion that Port Arthur soon will fall, and that Russia, rather than carry on a useless war, will sue for terms.

The reversal of opinion throughout the continent seems almost universal among ordinary observers, nor is mere sympathy wasted upon Russia. Her prestige has well-nigh vanished, and with it has gone that mingled awe and respect which constituted her greatness in European eyes.

Russian Locas Meny,
Tokio, June 6.—The Japanese and Russian lorces located north of Pulantien, which were in a series of brushes in the early part of last week had another encounter on Friday, June 3, near Chuchiatun. On that day the Japanese cavalrymen met the Russians at noon.

The Russians numbered 2,000 men, and were composed of infantry, detachments of cavalrymen and artillery. They were pressing the Japanese cavalry when the Japanese assembled their entire force and engaged the enemy. The Russians drew off gradually, and at half past five in the afternoon they retired to Telishu. The Japanese suffered four men killed and four men wounded in this fighting.

A report has been received here from Gen. Kuroki saying that on Friday last a detachment was despatched from Aiyangeheng (Aiyangeheng to make a reconnaisance towards Chaimatsi (Simati, 35 miles north of Fengwangcheng). The detachment encountered 600 Cossacks and after a brisk engagement the Russians retreated.

Gen. Kuroki reports that the Russian loss was heavy. The Japanese suffered only one man killed and three wounded.
