



Him in the Press. Cork, Oct. 23.—The scene at the rail-way station immediately prior to Red-moud's departure, for Queenstown was one of extraordinary enthusiasm. "And now," boiling with rage he ex-clamed, "this paper is grossly insulting our brethren in American and asserting that we are going to the United States to get subscriptions from American mur-der clubs. This shows the blind, un-reasoning hatred and opinion held by representatives of the British govern-ment, notwithstanding the fact, that a long list of officials and public men in America from the presidency down there have been representatives of our race."
