LEFT GLASS EYE TO WATCH WORKMEN

Dusky Natives Covered the Eye With a Hat and Then Went To Sleep.

Berlin, Nov. 18.—East African superstition and ingenuity are amusingly illustrated in an incident related by the German colonel, Dr. E. Nigmann, in his memoirs of the days when he was in charge of colonial administration in that part of the world.

One of his most reliable aides, he says, was a native lieutenant-colonel who had lost an eye during one of the local expeditions, and wore a glass one in its place. This officer was assigned to superintend the erection of a post office in rural district. The inhabitants had long been delinquent in tax payments, and consequently each male adult was required to put in a week's labor on the new government building.

One day while the native laborers were industriously at work under his vigilant watch, the lieutenant-colonel was temporarily called away. On leaving the building he took out the glass eye, placed it on one of the walls and announced to the workers: "Look here, my men. I must go now, I am leaving my eye to keep tab on you and to see that you keep working while I am away." It was with considerable self-satisfaction that he returned to find his gang hard at work.

Next day the lieutenant-colonel had another summons to leave his post. Again he placed the glass eye in charge and left. Returning, he noticed from afar that building operations were at a standstill and all of his dusky help snoring peacefully. Upon looking for his "foreman" eye he found covered with an old hat.

BANDITS FAIL AT MONTREAL BANK

Demanding \$10,000, But Teller Opened Fire With a Revolver.

Montreal, Nov. 18.—Two nervy bandits made a daring but unsuccessful attempt to hold up the teller of the Sterling Bank on St. James street this morning. The bank was crowded with customers at the time.

One of the bandits handed the teller a note on which was written: "Hand me over \$10,000 in ten dollar notes. Don't move and don't speak."

The teller made believe to be getting the money but drew a revolver. A customer waiting to cash a check guessed what was going on and jumped on one of the men. The teller fired at the "auditor" facing him and both robbers lost their nerve and ran out of the building by a side door. The teller fired at them again, but did not hit them.

HIGHEST QUALITY OF CANADIAN BACON

The Relative Value of Corn and Barley in Production of Bacon.

Fredericton, Nov. 18.—The first results obtained this morning from the slaughtering of four of the thirteen six month old hogs which have been used for experimental feeding purposes to determine the relative value of corn and barley in the production of first class bacon at the Dominion Experimental Station, showed an apparent even break on general examination. This afternoon, however, further results are expected to be shown with regard to weight and other essentials which are included in the grading of the various classes of bacon.

Mr. Stafford, of one of the Montreal packing houses, is supervising the demonstration at the station today. This morning he lectured on market requirements, with a view towards supplying the British market with the highest quality of Canadian bacon. The lecture accompanied by the demonstrations given were attended by a large number of the agricultural residents of York county this morning, while a larger number are expected to be present this afternoon, including Hon. D. W. Messervy, Minister of Agriculture.

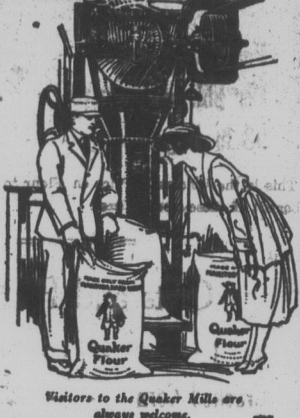
