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
The announcement of the formal spening of this Museum in the immedi-ite future renders a short description of the building and fits contents timely. It forms the central portion of the Bio-logical Building, and although acces-sible to students from the eastern floor, which is at present chieffy used. The western entrance, which is ap-pfroached by a handsome flight of steps, will soon be open to the public during certain hours in the day. Within this floor is a vestibule from which the lower floor of the museum is entered, and which contains a large section of Douglas pine, presented through Mr. Callaway of the C.P.R.
