Mrs. Albert E. Amherman

After eight years of declining health from diabetes, Mrs. Albert E. Amherman passed rather unexpectedly away on Friday morning, July 19th, at her home in Granville Perry. The development of bronchial asthma the week before her death was too much for her weakened condition of health to stand. On Tuesday last she became seriously ill; the three days of her illness were ones of much suffering, which was borne with Christian fortitude.

The deceased was, before her marriage, Sallie Ann (Minnie) only daughter of the late Israel L. and Adeline (Welsh) Troop of this village, where she was born on June 5th, 1857, being, therefore, at the time of her death sixty-eight years of age. Her only brother, Wallace O. Troop, passed away in 1917.

Mr. and Mrs. Amherman were married in 1882 by the Rev. James Strothard, their first home having been that now owned by Capt. and Mrs. Merriam. Mrs. Amherman was preceded by Mr. Amherman, who passed away suddenly on Dec. 26th, 1924.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Amherman were very highly respected and esteemed citizens whose passing away is a great loss to the village, in which they associated themselves with and worked for that which made for its best welfare. The United (Methodist) Church in particular regrets the passing of Mr. and Mrs. Amherman, who had been from youth loyal members and faithful workers. At the fortieth anniversary of the church a few years ago among the former members who again occupied the choir were Mr. and Mrs. Amherman.

Two sons survive, Harold T., who succeeded his father in the old established business, and Arthur W. at present at home, also five grandchildren, Dorothy, Margaret, Edna, Harold and Inez Amherman. Mrs. Amherman's bright and cheerful disposition and altogether likeable personality won for her many friends, who greatly regret her passing.

The funeral which was largely attended was conducted at the home Sunday afternoon by the Rev. R. B. Thomas. The hymns sung were: "Asleep in Jesus," "Will Your Anchor Hold?" and "Lead Kindly Light." The floral offerings were many and beautiful and include a handsome pillow from the sons bearing the word "Mother." The undertakers were Alfred Troop, Frank Troop, Bamford Miller and Sam Pickup. Interment was made in Wadewille Cemetery.

In less than fifteen months, death has claimed four members of the Amherman family, namely: William Amherman, Mrs. Harold Amherman, Albert E. Amherman and Mrs. Albert E. Amherman. It is a somewhat unusual coincidence that each of the four deaths occurred on a Friday, the funeral having been conducted on a Sunday. (Spectator)
