CATHOLIC FEDERATION TO THE PRESIDENT.

In view of the action taken by President Roosevelt to bring the coal strike to an end, deep interest attaches to a petition circulated throughout the country...

The petition does not ask the President to interfere in a political way. It simply asks him to use his good offices as the first citizen in the land to bring about a settlement.

"We, whose names are underwritten, citizens of the United States, most earnestly ask you to use your good offices in bringing to an end the unhappy strike now prevailing in the coal regions..."

"We do not ask you to use any official power in the matter, for you have none to use, we only ask you as the first citizen of the nation to mediate between these contending parties..."

"We recognize the fact that you would hesitate to interpose, even in the interests of peace and good-will, lest you should seem to be exceeding your prerogative..."

"This is not business, Mr. President, it is not politics; it is something much higher and finer. May God help you to render this great service to your country and crown you with the blessings that belong to the peacemaker..."

Among those who have already attached their signatures to this petition are Louis J. Kaufman, of Brooklyn, first vice-president of the Federation of Catholic Societies of America; John A. Henneberry, president of the New York State Council of Catholic Benevolent Legion; Oswald Maure, of New York, president of the Catholic Knights of America; Frederick Hochhausen, of Brooklyn, vice-president of the Central Society of America; Joseph Frey, of New York, a member of the executive committee of the Central Society of America; Alphonse G. Koebler, of New York, chairman of the national law committee of the American Federation of Catholic Societies; J. B. Seiz, of New York, treasurer of the American St. Cecilia Society; and Joseph Mellich, of Brooklyn, president of the German Catholic Society.

CATHOLIC PROTEST AGAINST BLASPHEMY.

Brooklyn, Sept. 29.-Catholics to the number of twenty thousand, most of whom are members of the Holy Name Society, participated in the great rally yesterday to protest against blasphemy. There were in reality fifteen separate parades, but the movement was spoken of as one demonstration, to publicly manifest veneration of God's name.

Fifteen churches in the diocese were designated as central rallying points, and the different parades were in streets in the district in which the rallying church was located.

Bishop McDonnell reviewed the parade in his district and heartily sanctioned this great protest against blasphemy, which is held annually under the supervision of Vicar-General P. J. McNamara. The Vicar-General, as part of the demonstration, delivered an address in the pro-cathedral. Mention of the rally was made in all the churches in Brooklyn yesterday morning and the men in the various parishes were invited to join in the demonstration.

In a letter sent by Vicar-General McNamara to pastors, which was read in all the churches yesterday, Mgr. McNamara said: "It is hoped that the demonstration of this year will, more than ever before, by its magnitude, make an abiding impression upon the minds and hearts of Catholics and non-Catholics alike, and that the lively faith and united prayers of those who take part will, under heaven, accomplish the most important results in stemming the tide of blasphemy and promoting veneration of the Holy Name."

BANQUET TO HON. CHAS. FITZPATRICK IN MONTREAL.

Montreal, Oct. 7.-Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, Minister of Justice, was tendered a banquet to-night by St. Patrick's Society and friends. In the course of his speech Mr. Fitzpatrick said: "The Irish Catholics in Canada are in a minority, and this is a distinct disadvantage so long as the qualifications for public positions are made to depend upon consideration of race and creed rather than upon fitness and capacity to do service to the State. If a position is to be assigned a Catholic, then we are supposed to form a part of the English-speaking minority. If, on the other hand, language is a requisition, then we are of the Catholic minority. In either case we are in the position of the man between the upper and lower millstone."

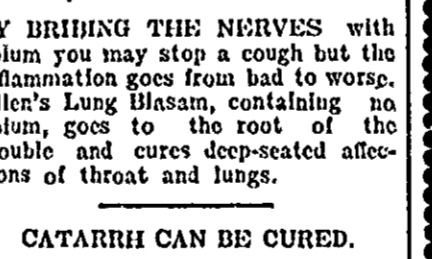
LOUISIANA O'LEARY.
