The reduction has been at the sate of seventy f wo million dollars per annum; and if continued for the next twelse years, will enti ely wipe out the war indebiedness.

There are State laws against the consolidation of corporations in the l'nited States, but there are likewise no end of loop-holes by which wealthy cumpauies manage to escape irom their direct violation. This is evidenced by the: recent purchase of the Baltimore and Ohio telegraph syatem by that great and growing monopoly, the Western Union Company. The B. \& O. system has been leased for fifty years, and five million dollars cash has beci. pad for the privilenes. The faw forbids purchase outright, but does not prohbit leasing, which, however, as far as the public are eoncerned, practically amounts to the same thins.
