### SYNODICAL RECORDS.

The attention of Ministers is requested to the following extract from the printed Minutes of Synod for 1852.

"The Clerk reported that agreeably to the instructions given by the Synod at a former meeting, as well as at the earnest solicitation of many members of the Synod, he had got printed ex-batin, from the First Volume of the Synod Records the Minutes of the Synod from the time of its first organization in 1831 up to 1836 in-clusive, and that, as the printed Minutes for several years onwards up to 1842 or 1844 were merely Abstracts of the Proceedings, and as the stock of these was nearly exhausted, he intended to carry on the work up to that point. The Synod approved of the diligence of the Clerk in this matter, and instructed him to prepare an Appendix consisting—First, of such "Memoranda from Preshytery Records" as it may be desirable, in a historical point of view, to have printed, and which Presbytery Clerks are hereby enjoined to furnish,—and, Second. of such Extracts from the Records of the Commission of Synod, and such other important Synodical documents having a bearing on the history of the Church, as may be agreed on by the Committee formerty appointed to advice with the Clerk in the matter, viz . the

remaining members of the First Synod. The Synod further, considering the present state of the Synod Fund, agreed that a separate contribution of not less than One Pound from each Minister be sent in as soon as possible (of which a separate account will be kept) for the special purpose of defraying the expense of this New Edition;—the said Edition to be distributed in such manner as the Synod may hereafter direct—the Clerk in the meantime furnishing each Minister with a copy as soon as ready."
