Question No. 1,932-Mr. Broadbent:

- 1. How much has the federal government contributed to the Canadian Olympic Committee for each year since 1964?
- 2. Is the Committee bound in any way to accept restraints imposed by Canada's external policy

with respect to (a) communist countries (b) South Africa (c) Rhodesia?

ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR CREW OF PATRICK MORRIS

Question No. 1,933-Mr. Lundrigan:

Were special arrangements made for the crew of the ill-fated *Patrick Morris* to contact their homes immediately on landing at Point Cartier and, if so, what were they?

Mr. Gérard Duquet (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Transport): The management of Canadian National Railways advise as follows: Prior to the rescue vessel arriving at Point Cartier the names of survivors were obtained by telephone and the families of the men were contacted by Newfoundland area officers.

When the men landed at Seven Islands they were immediately taken by charter bus to the airport where a charter Air Canada aircraft was standing by to fly them to Sydney. On arrival at Sydney those wishing to contact their families did so.

USE OF COMPUTER, DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL REVENUE

Question No. 1,934-Mr. Robinson:

- 1. Does the Department of National Revenue have the use of a computer in its operations and, if so, to what extent is it utilized?
- 2. Is the computer programmed 24 hours per day and, if not, for what reason?
- 3. What is the number of hours planned for utilization of the computer?
- 4. What has been the annual cost of computer services for each year 1960 to 1970 inclusive?
- 5. How many programs are in preparation for the computer at the present time and how will each affect the efficiency of the Department?

Hon. Herb Gray (Minister of National Revenue): In so far as the Customs and Excise Division is concerned: 1. The Customs and Excise Division utilizes a computer in the following operations: (a) Financial management statements prepared by the Department of Supply and Services computer facilities. (b) Sales tax licencee distribution reporting system provided by the I.B.M. Service Bureau facility.

- 2 and 3. The Department of Nationa Revenue, Customs and Excise, does not have its own computer facilities.
- 4. Financial management statements are presently supplied by the Department of Supply and Services on a no charge basis.
