Flora MacDonald (Secretary of State for External Affairs):** Mr. Speaker, earlier today in response to a question from the hon. member for Cape Breton Highlands-Canso (Mr. MacEachen), I think I used the words, with regard to Foothills and their wire to me, that they would be submitting an application tomorrow morning. In order to clarify that I should read their actual words regarding what they will be submitting to the National Energy Board:

Tomorrow morning, Wednesday, Foothills will file with the NEB another four volumes of material including 1,150 pages and 60 maps. Thus we have complied with all the information requests of the board and the Foothills all land route application is ready to be heard when we make that formal request of the board.

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**ATOMIC ENERGY****ESTABLISHMENT OF SPECIAL JOINT COMMITTEE**

**On the order: Government notices of motion:**

October 22, 1979—The President of the Privy Council:

That a special joint committee of the Senate and the House of Commons be appointed to inquire into the economic, social, environmental, health and international considerations bearing upon the role of the Government of Canada in the development, use, regulation and export of nuclear energy, including but not limited to:

(a) energy and economic policy considerations:

(i) the costs, risks and benefits of nuclear electric generation in comparison with practical alternatives;

(ii) the role of fission power in the national energy economy;

(iii) the allocation of federal research and development funds for nuclear energy matters, including the potential for a Canadian role in the development of fusion technology;

(iv) the relation of Canadian nuclear science and technology to industrial strategy and quality of employment objectives;

(b) social and environmental policy considerations:

(i) the basis for the adequacy of national nuclear, health, safety and environmental standards and of compliance monitoring;
