Order adopted by the Liberals in 1981, the Order is still in effect today.

EMPLOYMENT

ROLE OF SMALL BUSINESS—GOVERNMENT POSITION

Mr. Jean-Guy Guilbault (Drummond): Mr. Speaker, the present Government recognizes the major role played by small businesses in innovative economic growth and job creation.

To promote the availability of capital for small businesses, the Government has announced a number of measures including the capital gains tax exemption, increased availability of capital from pension funds and registered retirement savings plans, and tax incentives for labour-sponsored venture capital funds.

The Minister of Supply and Services (Mr. McInnes) has set up a supplier awareness program to help small businesses acquire a larger share of public sector purchasing.

Small- and medium-sized businesses involved in research and development will receive a full and immediate refund of the tax credit which they earn on their first \$2 million of research and development.

Thanks to the changes in RRSPs announced in the Budget, private sector entrepreneurs will now be able to manoeuver in order to plan for their retirement as adequately as other Canadians.

Mr. Speaker, small business is said to be responsible for most of the new jobs created in Canada in recent years. By trying to encourage small business, the present Government is helping to create jobs and stimulate the economy.

THE ECONOMY

SITUATION IN QUEBEC

Mr. Richard Grisé (Chambly): Since the September 4, 1984 election, Mr. Speaker, Quebecers have witnessed a considerable improvement in their province's economic situation as a result of the new climate of co-operation which followed our predecessors' confrontation approach.

Last week Statistics Canada confirmed that our Government's economic renewal and job creation initiatives have given encouraging results. The Bank of Canada rate has

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dropped 3.53 per cent since the election and now stands at 8.35 per cent, the lowest in seven years. The 4 per cent inflation rate, practically unchanged in over a year, has created the most stable climate since 1971. Those figures show conclusively that, since we took office, Canadian men and women have been more confident in the future. That was the sentiment expressed to me by community groups of the riding of Chambly when we met recently.

Yes, Mr. Speaker, all such signs clearly show that, unlike those of our prodecessors, our 1984 election campaign promises were not empty words. Once again our Government has lived up to its commitments.
