My dear Mr. Mitchell.

Let me endeavour to deal with the points raised in Mr. Logan's letter to Dr. Percival.

I feel I must make some comment on the first paragraph of Mr. Logan's letter. For many years past candidates for admission to the first year in McGill University coming from the Province of Quebec have entered by two routes, viz., (1) by writing the School Leaving Examinations offered at the end of the Eleventh Grade in the public high schools of the Province and (2) by writing the McGill Junior Matriculation Examinations. Gandidates from the high schools have uniformly entered by route number one and all other candidates by route number two.

As long as both these groups of candidates wrote the same examination papers, set and examined by a joint panel of examiners acceptable to both parties, no difficulties arose. Last year the matriculation results were returned to the University and published at an earlier date than the corresponding School Leaving results. But before the latter results were published, the marks in two subjects.. i.e., Latin and Chemistry, were raised by the High School Leaving Board. Under these circumstances, and in order to continue the rule of absolute fairness and equality between both groups of the original marks on the School Leaving examinations, and consequently several candidates from the schools, who had passed as a result of the marking which had not been raised, failed to pass on the original marking, and were refused
