MAY HAVE THE DUTY ON SAMPLES REFUNDED

This is Said to Have Been Decided in Washington Reciprocity Negotiations.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—One important feature of the negotiations at Washington is said here to be the extension to the United States of the provisions of the French treaty (article xiv.), by which a commercial traveler may, upon entering Canada, deposit the dutiable value of his samples with the first customs house which he meets, with the understanding that, should the samples be still intact, receive a rebate of the full amount of duty deposited.

TWO VICTIMS OF REAR END PITCH-IN ON G. T. R.

Train Running Thirty Miles an Hour Collides With Another, Which Had Been Stalled.

KINGSTON, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—Two men lost their lives, another being injured, in one of the worst wrecks which ever occurred in this vicinity. The scene was on the Grand Trunk, near Collins Bay, seven miles from Kingston, at 2 o'clock this morning. Two freight trains in the crush. The dead are William Dennis, engineer, and Thomas McDermott, fireman, both from Belleville. William Cunningham, brakeman, of Gananoque, was badly injured, his right arm being amputated upon his arrival at the hospital.

DROPPED DEAD.

GUELPH, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—Frank Dewler, for 25 years one of the best known drygoods merchants of Guelph, and only recently retired from business, dropped dead at his residence this evening. He was in his usual good health, and had just come in from a drive, when in a severe fit of coughing he ruptured a blood vessel and expired immediately. He leaves a widow and family of grown up daughters.

The Cartridge Exploded.

ROCKLAND, Jan. 23.—A peculiar and very bad accident occurred at the home of Thomas York, when his youngest son had the end of the first finger of his right hand blown off. At the time he was picking a revolver cartridge to get the lead out so that he might use the shell for his lead pencil. The boy lit a match to look inside when it exploded. The palm of his right hand and his forehead are badly burned.

Importing Alien Women.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Jan. 23.—(Special.)—Sam Moldstein was today held in \$1500 bail, on a charge of bringing alien women into the United States. His alleged partner, Isaac Wolonski, was held in \$500 bail.

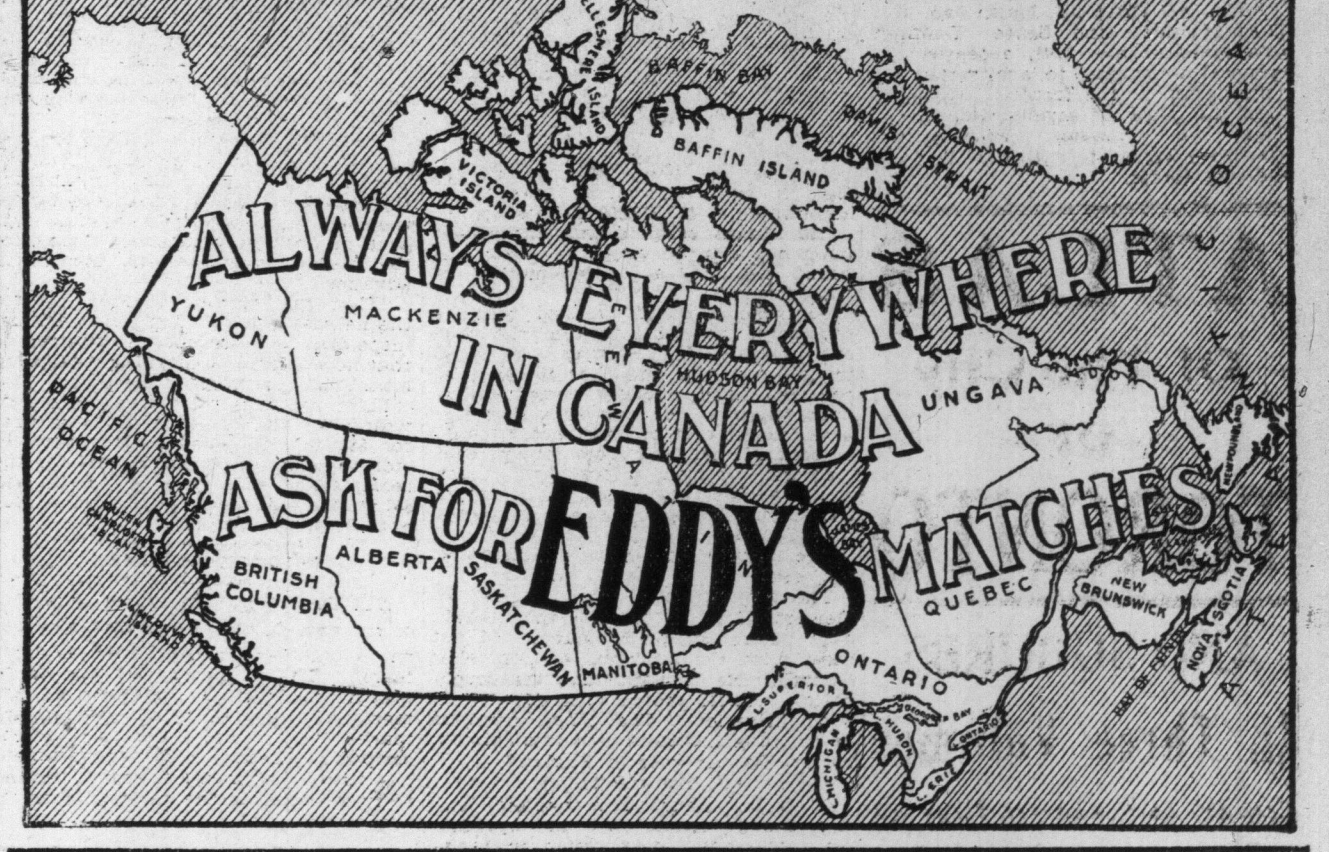
Mr. Caskey's Trip.

BROCKVILLE BOY MISSING

Believed to Have Skated into River and Been Drowned.

BROCKVILLE, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—J. Leslie Sheridan, aged 22, a Brockville boy, filling the position of assistant agent on the New York Central Railway at Morristown, across the river from here, has been missing since last night. He spent the day in Brockville, and between nine and ten o'clock left here to skate to the other side. The channel in the river is open in several places, and the belief grows that he went into open water and was drowned. Two men on the shore heard cries for help coming from the direction of the river shortly after the hour Sheridan is said to have left Brockville.

Dr. Mable's Lectures.

Rev. Dr. Henry C. Mable of Boston is continuing his daily public lectures in McMaster University, each afternoon from 4 o'clock till 5. The subjects all fall under the one general heading of "The Spell of Christian Missions," but each afternoon a different phase will be spoken upon. Today Dr. Mable will speak on "Brotherhood for Souls"; on Wednesday "The Channel for Enthusiasm" will be his subject; on Thursday the topic chosen is "The Fascination of the Crucial," and on Friday the lecture will be upon "The Yearning for the Eternal." The meetings are open not only to students, but to the general public as well. They were largely attended last week, and it is hoped that a still greater number will take advantage of this chance to hear Dr. Mable.

Adding to the Force.
