**W. E. FINDLAY'S AMENDMENT**  
To Shorten Playing Field; Also to Have Ten Instead of Twelve Players.

President Murphy received the following amendment to go before the N.L.T. meeting on April 8, from W. E. Findlay of Montreal:

"I beg to give notice that I will move at the annual meeting of the N.L.T. on April 8 next, that the teams shall be composed of ten men each, instead of 12, and that the playing field shall not be less than 120 yards or more than 180 yards in length, the distance from goal to goal to be 100 yards, the width of the field not to exceed 80 yards, W. E. Findlay."

The present rule says that the goal posts must not be less than 120 yards apart, with no restriction how wide or how long the playing field may be.

Charles Quirre of the Tecumseh appears to have a high opinion of Mr. Findlay and believes there may be a lot in the amendment. He was not prepared to say which way Tecumseh would vote on the matter, as it was intended to hold an executive meeting at an early date, when the amendment in question would be thoroughly discussed.

The first question to arise is, would the playing of ten men improve the game or would it be a detriment. As far as the change in the grounds is concerned, the M.A.A. grounds in Montreal will be the only ones on which much change will be made, as the other fields in the union are not much larger than the distances mentioned in Mr. Findlay's amendment.

The reduction of players would mean two salaries less to pay, also travelling expenses on the trip. This is a consideration
