

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 29.-Duke Kaanamoku, the Hawaiian swimmer, held his second workout in Weightman Ha!! yesterday, before a crowd which thronged the gallery. Coach Kistler had nearly

ed the gallery. Coach Kistler had nearly his whole university squad in the water to demonstrate the different methods of turning. The giant Kanaka started his work by racing John K. Shryock, Penn's champion sprint swimmer, for 160 yards. Kistler gave Shryock & seconds handicap over his opponent, but even with this start Duke caught up to the Quaker on his last lap and finished five or six feet ahead of him.

The Hawalian traveled the distance in 56 2-5 seconds, which is 2-5 of a second better than he did on Monday, showing that he has slightly improved in his turning. Even yesterday, however, it was thought he lost at least a second by his method of reversing.

Besides Chryock, Kistler had Sanville, who has shown such development in the 100-yard swim; Ouerbacker, the 50-yard dasher, and Henry Scott, the fastest man from the Argo Swimming Club, in the pool.

Kahanamoku has covered 100 yards straightaway in 55 4-5 seconds, which is 1 1-5 seconds better than the world's record, beld by Cecil Healey of Australia. 
FIRST BOXING RULES. Who Was Burled in West-minster Abbey.

Few people are aware of the fact that a pugilist was buried in Westminster Abbey. In an article of much interest in "London Stories," it is stated that Jack Broughton, sometimes described as the founder of the British School of Boxing, was buried in the West Cloister in 1789. Late in life Broughton became a Yeoman of the Guard, and the inscription on the wall tablet reads: "Beneath this tablet lie the remains of Mrs. Elizabeth Broughton, died Sept. 7, 1784, aged 59 years." The gravestone also has an inscription, but there is a blank between the name and the year. It is stated that but for the objection of the Dean, this would have been filled with the words, "Champion of England."

Broughton was born in 1704, and was the first winner of Doggett's Coat and Badge. He made his first appearance as a pugillist at George Adam's famous booth at the Adam and Eve. in Totenham Court-road. Later he set up an establishment of his own, and maintained his ascendancy for many years, being eventually unexpectedly beaten by Slack in April, 1750, at Birmingham.
