



CHINESE WERE FRIENDLY.

Massacre, at Nanchang Not Due to General Hat

Shanghai, March 2 .- An account of he massacre at Nanchank says: Fifteen Methodists, 12 English Pro-Fifteen Methodists, 12 English Pro-testants and 14 French Catholic mis-sionaries were in the city last Thurs-day night when the French Catholics had a quarret with an official over a suit for the possession of property. Great excitement prevailed on Friday-A mass meeting was held on Saturday and was followed on Sunday by a riot, during which the property of the Ca-tholics was burned. The Protestants took tefuge in the adjoining house of Mr. Kingman. The house was burned and six priests and two members of the Kingman family were killed. The Ohinese governor never attempted to check the riot and rescue the mission-aries.

The men of the Methodist mission

The men of the Methodist mission atded by Chinese soldiers, took their school girls to Chinese homes in the city, and brought Miss Hoyt and Miss Kann from a hospital. All took re-fuge in midriver in a launch which was furnished by Chinese officers. The laurch waited until Chinese soldiers brought the remaining missionaries at daylight on Monday. The launch reach-ed Klukang on Thursday. The wound-ed Kingman girl died on the way. Chinese could have blocked the nas-sage of the launch on the 12 hours' journey down the river, but they were friendly. Rev. A. P. Quirmbach of the Methodist China inhand missions 'e mained at Nanchang to care for pro-perty.


