A NOTORIOUS CROOK WHO HAS LONG

BEEN WANTED.

Two Hamilton Detectives Found Him

Littering About the City and Took Him

In After a Chase—Lumber Contract

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RUSSO-TURKISH COMPACT.

OFFICIAL DENIALS OF THE AL-

LIANCE NOT BELIEVED.

A Belief That Sir Philip Currie Has Been

Overreached and Will be Situation—

Russia Master of the Situation—

Reports Entered at Berlin and in the

Austrian Capital.

London, Jan. 25.—Although the Govern-

ments here and in Berlin concur in

denying all knowledge of an offensive

and defensive alliance between Russia

and Turkey, little confidence is placed

in their professions of ignorance. Semi-

official denials, in a case like this are

to be expected, especially when the de-

feated diplomats wish to conceal the

truth or prevent its being told.

Within three weeks Parliament will

assemble. Before that period has elapsed

the evidence of the existence of a

Russo-Turkish compact will probably

become so complete that further de-

nials will be impossible. In Ministerial

circles it is believed that Sir Philip

Currie, the British Ambassador to

Turkey, will be recalled and that the

action is due to the fact that he has

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CURIOSITIES OF THE LAW.

How William Rose, the Convicted Per-

sonator, Got Through Col. Denison's

Regiment of Cavalry.

Osgoode Hall, Jan. 25, 1896.

Section 167 of the Consolidated Mun-

icipal Act of 1882 provides that: "(1)

No person shall—(a) apply for a bail

paper in the name of some other per-

son, whether that name is of a person

living or dead, or of a fictitious per-

son; or (2) a person guilty of any

violation of this section shall be liable

to imprisonment for a term not

exceeding six months, with or with-

out hard labor." This section is taken

from R.S.O. (1887), ch. 184, sec. 167 (2). If

the framers of the Consolidated Act

had stopped here, William Rose, the per-

sonator, would now be in jail and at

hard work. But he was not satisfied

with the section as it stood, and felt

that he should seek another way to

make the statute complete. A student

of divinity was once asked at an exami-

nation to name the first King of Israel.

He wrote "Saul," but thinking his an-

swer too brief, added, on second

thoughts, "who was the first King of

Israel?" The draughtsman of the Mun-

icipal Act wrote 41 more sections after 167,

and then thinking of a person or a bal-

lance as to personation, picked sec. 8

of ch. 54 V.C. (1881), out of that

later statute. The personation section

is as follows: "(2) Every person who is

a person living or dead, or of a ficti-

tious person, shall be deemed to have

committed the offence of personation,

and shall incur a penalty of \$200, and

in default of the payment of the pen-

alty and costs, the offender shall be

imprisoned for a term not exceeding

six months, with or without hard

labor." The learned Chancellor

holds that two sections cannot be

read together, or the punishments re-

sponding to the one offence, or as

alternatives punishments for the one

offence. The very essence of criminal

law is to be certain in its sanctions. The

law later in date as well as later in

the statute must be construed in ac-

cord with the earlier. The earlier

statute, Robinson v. Emerson, 4
