THE MOHEGAN HORROR. Mr. James Blackey of Toronto is Certainly Among the Lost. FEARS FOR JOHN HYSLOP OF ANCASTER. He Was to Sail on the Ill-Fated Ship and There Are No Tidings of Him—Eleven Passengers Were Saved and Ten Bodies Have Been Recovered, Including That of Mr. Blackey—Cause of the Disaster a Mystery.

The Mohegan disaster off the Lisard, the southernmost light station of Great Britain, provides another marine horror that will go down in history. While it furnishes a parallel in some respects to the Bourgeois disaster of Sable Island last July, there is a marked contrast in other ways.

Mr. James Blackey, the European buyer for Messrs. John Macdonald & Co., was a passenger upon the wrecked steamer and is numbered among the victims of the disaster.

Mr. Blackey, who lives at 124 George street with his family, is almost prostrated with grief and still has hopes that everything may be right.

Mr. John Macdonald has cabled that the body be sent to Toronto as soon as possible. Mr. Blackey came into the employ of the John Macdonald Company over 18 years ago, as an entry clerk, before that time he had been employed by John Gatto.

Mr. A. C. L. Smith of Oregon, a passenger, surrendered to a woman in the water wreckage that was supporting him, and swam ashore unaided. The woman was saved. Her name is reported as Miss Webb, but no such name appears in the company's list.

Mr. W. H. Hyslop, Jr., has been very anxious, since the report of the Mohegan disaster reached this city, as the name of his cousin, John Hyslop of Ancaster, Ont., is upon the passenger list.

Eleven Passengers Saved, Ten Bodies Recovered and Thirty-Three Missing. London, Oct. 16.—The Atlantic Transport Company issued the following statement this evening regarding the fate of the passengers and crew of the steamer:

Of the passengers 11 have been saved; 10 bodies have been recovered and 33 are missing.

Some of the Recovered Bodies. The bodies of the following passengers have been recovered: T. W. King, Edna King, Master King, James Blackey, Miss R. M. Cowd, Doctor Fallows, B. Franklin Miller, Mrs. L. M. Luke, George Seymour, Miss L. H. Warrenner.

Later Details of the Calamity. St. Keverna, Oct. 15.—In the lower end of the church here lie fifteen bodies, among them those of four women and one 12-year-old girl. The bodies are laid out recently. The faces of the victims present a sad sight, showing how rudely the waves and rocks played with their features.

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WERE AFTER HUMBERT, TOO. Plot Against the German Emperor Had Big Ramifications. Fifteen Anarchists in All Have Been Arrested—A Bomb of Gunpowder Was to Be Thrown at the Kaiser in the Narrow Streets of Castro-Confederates Sent to Jerusalem.

London, Oct. 17.—The Alexandria correspondent of The Daily Mail, telegraphing regarding the anarchist plot against Emperor William which was discovered on Friday, says:

The plot against the Kaiser is hardly proven more important, each arrest disclosing new ramifications. The documents found disclose a plot to kill King Humbert, already well matured.

Fifteen persons, all Italians, have been arrested. The original plan was to throw a bomb of gun cotton and fulminate of mercury on Emperor William's carriage in a narrow street of Cairo. When the Egyptian trip was abandoned, elaborate arrangements were made by the conspirators to send confederates to Jerusalem to carry out the plot during the dedication of the German Church of Our Redeemer.
