GOT FROM \$50 TO \$200 PER BODY.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 14.-Four zinc-lined

to earry samples, each containing a corpse, were taken from the baggage room at Union Station to-day, and Frank Thompson, who says he is city undertaker of Memphis, Tenn., is under arrest.

For some time the police have been aware that a traffic in human bodies has been going on through this city, and have been on the watch for evidence. Recently a shipment of four bodies in trunks was made, addressed to W. H. Hamsen at Keokuk, Iowa, to whom those captured to-day were consigned.

When taken to police headquarters, Thompson made a clean breast of the whole affair. He said he had the contract for burying the city dead of Memphis. For some time he had been selling the bodies to medical colleges throughout this part of the country. His method was to pack them with excelsior in drummers' zinc-lined trunks, and take them with him as baggage as far as St. Louis. From here he shipped the trunks to their destination by express. Thompson said he had been by express. Thompson said he had been paid all the way from \$50 to \$200 per body.
