GAVE DYING FATHER POISON

day following and carefully examined the room in which Joseph Sifton was said to have been down to death by his son. He found no blood inside the room. He passed into the barn thru the trapdoor in which the old man stood when his brains were knocked out by the first blow of the ax. There were no blood stains there, Herbert's confession mentions that the blood from the dying man's battered head scattered over the hay in the loft, and that the son threw this blood-stained hay into the bottom of the barn after the killing. At that time Sifton was protected and already dead, and the witness was examining the interior of the barn for evidence of a death struggle and blood. This witness had passed along the road near the barn about the hour the killing occurred. He said he heard hammering in the top of the barn at that time. This corroborates the theory of the defence that the son was knocking off these planks at the time when he fell thru to his death.

It developed that the victim wore a pair of new tan boots the morning of his death. The point to this feature is that he was more likely to slip and fall as the defence claims, with new shoes. Edmund Meredith, K.C., was called upon to identify an old will made by Joseph Sifton, in which his property was to be inherited, in the event of his death, by his son, the prisoner. The defence objected to the admission of the will because it had not been shown to have been known by the accused at the time of the murder, there being no evidence to show that the witness, Susie Bathurst, a vivacious young woman, entered the box. She admitted, with a blush, that she had seen the will, but that she had not read it. "Pshaw, I don't believe it, sure you don't mean 17?" observed Mr. John Burgess, who lives near the Sifton home, and was there the day of the death. She heard the hammering in the barn just before the victim is supposed to have met his death.

Jacob Burgess gave damning evidence against the prisoner. He had been jailed for drunkenness, and had talked with Sifton. He said the accused had told him that he was dying after a fight with Walter Herbert, and then he had equaled on him. The cross-examination brought out the fact that the prisoner has frequently been in jail for libelling too freely. The witness was badly confused.

Ghostly Exhibit. David G. McNeill, the coroner and the physician who attended the victim during the few hours he lingered the day of the tragedy, produced a human skull to indicate the location of the wounds on the dying man's head. He had found several wounds which might have been made by the ax. The physician was dressing the wounds, Gerald Sifton came into the room. "My poor father, my poor father, how I hate to see you suffer!" observed the doctor. "Have you got anything to stop him suffering?" asked the prisoner. "I had, meaning that I had some morphine. Finally he broke out again: "My poor father, how I hate to see you suffer! If you have nothing to put him out of his misery, I have. I have some strychnine."

"I held up my hands to stop the man talking in such a strain. Then he continued: "If money is any object to you, Doctor, to put him out of his misery—I'll then stop him from talking to me by turning away."

During the recital of this fatal story, the prisoner manifested little interest and not the slightest emotion. As the doctor told of his cold-blooded proposition, all eyes turned toward the accused, but the man continued oblivious of the disagreeable situation in which he was placed, and alike indifferent to the dangerous nature of the evidence. But, if the prisoner failed to realize that the room was lightening around his neck, his counsel were alert to the importance of the situation, and began a most vigorous cross-examination.
